

# Charlotte Gets Good Cleaning Upon This Day

The Civic Department of The Women's Club Carry Out Plans They Made Some Days Ago and Get Co-Operation.

Waste Paper Company is to Take Away all Debris—Sanitary Officers Will Be Judges of Prizes Awarded to The Collectors.

The child who takes up the most dirt will receive \$25. The next best debris collector will get \$15, the next best \$10 and the next best \$5. Sanitary officers of the city will pass judgment upon which boy has filled the most barrels or bags of dirt, tin cans, etc. The officers will, of course, be governed to some extent by the officials of the Waste Paper Company who are to haul away all of the "things" found.

Clean-Up Day in Charlotte was made famous two years ago and it follows actions of a similar nature taken in other states. Through the interested efforts of the ladies of the Women's Club here it is made possible again in the Queen City, and the work of all the children who have made applications at many homes to be allowed to "get away" their tin cans and old rags and dirt, too, have been frequent.

# Unique Will Filed In Clerk's Office

A will that is somewhat unique has been filed in the office of the clerk of the court. It is that of Peter John, who died recently, but who was a native of Mt. Lebanon, in Turkey. He was for a time one of the leading merchants of the Syrian colony here and won the confidence of the merchants with whom he dealt.


The will is dated June 3rd, 1910, and gives his estate as \$1,250, which he deposited in the banks here as follows: First National, \$1,100; Merchants and Farmers' \$75; Charlotte National, \$210.

He names Zokia John, his brother, and Akel Normi as his executors. They however declined to serve in that capacity and Mr. J. D. McCall was appointed in their place.

He leaves all his estate to his widow and the three children, who reside in Naker Ibrahim, of the district of Kistrwan, in Mount Lebanon, Turkey. His executor is to pay his widow \$10 per month during her life time and after her death the rest of the estate goes to the three children, who are Atfa John, Marie John and Akel John. His widow's name is Halah Sahyoun in the Syrian tongue.

Special to The News. Greensboro, March 31.—A number of Guilford county public schools have been inspected during the past week by Dr. B. W. Page, of the state board of health, with a view of ascertaining the conditions and the prevalence of the hookworm disease throughout the county.

An investigation of the 13 schools visited showed that hookworm was prevalent in about 18 per cent of the pupils of the schools and that sanitary conditions were good.

The city board of education met yesterday afternoon to decide on the contract for the heating system for the new Central High School building and decided to award the contract to B. McKenzie. The contract price is \$5,490.00.

Mrs. Nannie Elizabeth Wood, of Graham, died at St. Leo's hospital yesterday, to which place she had been brought for treatment.
