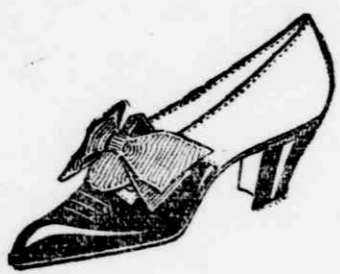

WANT BRIDGES AT TWO POINTS OVER CATAWBA

Twenty-five representative citizens from Mecklenburg and Gaston counties, armed with duplicate copies of a petition aggregating 2,000 names, appeared before the county commissioners yesterday afternoon and advocated the co-operation of Mecklenburg with Gaston county in building two bridges over the Catawba river, one at Mount Holly and one at Soap's ferry.

The committees from the two counties will confer at an early date as to the project of building the two bridges. After that the Mecklenburg committee will report to a full meeting of the Mecklenburg commissioners and each committee will submit their report to their respective boards for final approval.

Mr. C. O. Keister, of the Greater Charlotte Club, who was largely instrumental in circulating and collecting the petitions, appeared before the commissioners in behalf of the undertaking. Mr. John Holland, of Mount Holly, also appeared with a delegation of six Gaston county citizens in behalf of the movement and the result was the appointing of the above-named committee.
