Hon. J. Y. Joyner Back At Home

Special to The News.

Raleigh, April 4.—Hon. J. Y. Joyner, state superintendent of public instruction, is in his office again after an educational trip that included attendance on the big Wayne county public school commencement at Goldsboro last week, the first affair of the kind ever held in the state. And he is enthusiastic over the quickening interest that events of this kind are shown to have for the general advancement of the public school interest of a county and the cultivation of a helpful spirit of rivalry among the schools and among the pupils of each school.

There is much speculation here as to the probable selection by Governor Kitchen of a successor to Judge Joseph S. Adams, of Asheville, as superior court judge from the Fifteenth district, who died Sunday at Warrenton where he held court last week. In this district Judge Fred Moore, of this district died. Governor Glenn appointed Hon. J. D. Murphy as his successor to serve until the fall elections. At that time Judge Adams was an active candidate for the appointment and felt in this his friends carried the fight into the judicial district convention with the result that Adams won the nomination from Judge Murphy. New the probability is being discussed of Governor Kitchen giving the commission to the unexpired term of Judge Adams to Judge Murphy. The appointment will have to be made from among lawyers in the Fifteenth district composed of the counties of Buncombe, Madison and Transylvania counties. It is pointed out that all the leading lawyers who would make good judicial timber were Craig men in the memorable Kitchen-Craig fight for the governorship in the state democratic convention at Charlotte three years ago.

The bill for the new auditorium building that Raleigh is building at a cost of \$250,000 and before a grand while the interior work will be completed. The building is admired very greatly as a thorough credit to the Capital City and the state at large. It is to be completed ready for occupancy by the early fall and the new political conventions are to be invited to the big auditorium.

Governor Kitchen has been elected a member of the Occidentals. The improved Order of Red Men, this city, and the braves will take the governor's scalp in the administering of the first degree on Friday of next week. It is a notable fact that there are now about 10,000 members of the order in this state. At least there are well over 9,000 and the order is making a special effort for the 10,000 by the next annual session which will be in Elizabeth City the last week in May.
