BRIBERY IN ELECTIONS.

We raise a big howl when a senator from some far-away state buys his election, and yet, too frequently, grow quiet when crookedness is reported nearer home.

To come nearer the point, it is per-

sistently rumored that money and whiskey played a part in the recent municipal primary. The city has received a lot of undesirable advertising the state over because such rumors have been given publicity.

In the excitement of an election such reports are usually exaggerated to the superlative degree. One drunk man is pictured as a battalion, etc., etc.

Still there is no occasion for smoothing over even the slightest breach of the common rules of honesty and decency.

Nor is there occasion for verbal hysteria. What would be more to the point would be for the proper officials to go to the bottom of the matter, regardless of whose toes were trampled upon.

There are those who claim to have positive information regarding debauchery in the recent election.

Let them play the role of the good citizen and furnish such damning evidence to the proper officials.

The law is clear on this point.

Penalty is provided for bribery, and the laws against drunkenness in public places, disorderly conduct, etc., are clear.

There is a grand jury. There is a recorder, a prosecuting attorney and a coterie of policemen.

If laws have been broken, is it not time to act?

The citizens of Charlotte do not sanction bribery and booze in elections. They are in sympathy with the laws against such abuses, and they expect their officials to do their duty.

Bring the bribe givers and the bribe takers to justice, if they exist, no matter who they are, nor upon which side they were lined up in the campaign.

A little action upon the facts as they really are, shorn of all their verbal embellishment, will do more than a babble of empty voices.

The way to keep the elections pure is to punish severely those actively engaged in debauching them, and the best time to begin is now.

In very able manner Dr. Hulten, in last night's sermon, pictured the evils of improper campaigning methods and the peril of bribery in elections.

If such existed, what is going to be done about it?

For this reason millions of independent and republican voters cast their ballots for democrats in the last election, and will continue to do so if the democratic party proves true to the trust committed to it."

Of course, those business men from Charleston meant to boost their town, but after having seen such North Carolina cities as Charlotte and Greensboro will they be content to go back to Charleston and live there?—Wilmington Dispatch.

Food

Man is an animal. No matter what theorists and theologians may say of the soul, spirit, astral body, etc., we all know and admit that physiologically speaking man is an animated body—an organism composed of about 16 chemical elements, which is capable of sensation and motion. Thus the two parts of man with which the therapist has to deal are the vital and material—body and life.

The body is destroyed and recreated every seven years. It is a rule of physiology that no particle of matter can retain life after it has once been used. Ceaseless motion is the law of our being. Since in all bodies there is a constant waste, there must be a constant renewal.

The body is made of food and air. The only element we get from the air is oxygen. After the food goes through certain processes of fysical and chemical change—mastication, deglutition, digestion, sanguification, it becomes blood. "The blood is the life." Pure blood is blood containing only those elements needed to renew the body. If the vital organs, particularly the excretory, act perfectly, the blood will be pure, no matter what food is eaten.

But even if the excretory organs acted perfectly, it is self-evident that if we are careless about our eating, we give them double work and make them give way quicker. We should not impose on the willing horse. Hence we should use some judgment about diet, eating, as near as possible, only those foods which contain the largest percent of nutriment and the smallest of deleterious substances.

Since the world was vegetarian up till the flood,—for 1656 years, it is plain that a fleshless diet is better, other things being equal, than a meat or even mixed diet. Again, since the Allwise Creator forbade his chosen people to eat certain beasts, birds and fishes, we may know that the hog and other unclean beasts are good things to let alone.

The sense of hunger is the proper guide as to when and how much we should eat. We should eat exactly when hungry—not before or after.

THE LATE JOHN B. McDONALD

The late John B. McDonald, famous the world over as the builder of the New York subway, who died recently after a long illness at his New York residence.

Bartholomew McDonald, father of the contractor came to New York from Ireland, and began work as a laborer, later becoming a contractor. His son followed in his footsteps, but instead of being only known locally, he gained a country wide reputation. His name became known in connection with some of the most important railroad construction contracts of the generation. His work can be seen on the West Shore Railroad, in the Potomac Valley, on the extension of the Illinois Central from Elgin to Wisconsin, the Trenton cut-off on the Pennsylvania, the Akron junction in Ohio, the extension of the Baltimore & Ohio from Baltimore to Philadelphia and many others.

He projected and built the famous underground Baltimore Belt Line at a cost of \$80,000,000 which gave him a national reputation. It was a work of enormous difficulty, and its completion put the contractor in the front rank of his profession.
