fight in progress and saw the people at Caton's house. He had seen Caton and Ella Brewer together since Caton's conditional pardon, and knew the woman lived on the place.

R. K. Stutzman had fought chickens himself and knew what was happening when the people started across the field with sacks in their hands. The general reputation of Caton was bad. W. H. McGinn has been a constable in Sharon township for 12 years and knew when Caton was arrested and convicted and sentenced to the roads.

His life since his pardon was no improvement over his life prior to his conviction. Ella Brewer is now the mother of a young baby. Joe Plentzen lives near Caton and gave about the same testimony.

The defense will attempt to show that Caton was not aware of the plans of the men who fought the chickens; that they drove to his home and hitched their horses and started for what they thought was South Carolina territory. The two chickens he had in a bag were given to him, he will plead, and he could not prevent the fight—that he did not encourage it. Other accusations made by his neighbors he emphatically denies.

When all of the testimony for and against the man has been presented Mr. Smith will forward the case to the governor. Action will be taken perhaps this week and Caton will know whether he is to continue the enjoyment of his conditional pardon, or is to return to the chain gang and serve more than a year.

In the meanwhile he is in the custody of the sheriff where he has been since his arrest on the 31st of March. Still can not be granted, and there can be no appeal from the decision of Governor Kitchen.

Probe by Democrats Shows Amazing Lot Of Extravagance

One of the most interesting documents produced by any congressional authority in a long time is the report by Representative A. Mitchell Palmer, of Pennsylvania, on the payroll of the house.

Mr. Palmer headed a sub-committee that conducted a careful inquiry with the view of discovering why there were so many employees of the house, whether they were needed, and what duties they performed.

This is the report which resulted in the democratic caucus deciding to lop off \$182,680 worth of salaries in the service of the house.

The committee found for instance that the three-year-old daughter of Chief Doorkeeper Lyone was on the payroll as "clerk to the doorkeeper" at a salary of \$1,200 a year—and getting an extra month's pay each year as part of the cheerful gratuity that congress is wont to give to congressional employees.

Office is Abolished. The investigating committee was unable to discover any functions which the "clerk to the doorkeeper" could perform, worth such a salary, and so at its recommendation the position will be abolished.

It was the observation of the inquirers that while new positions in the house service have been created from time to time, none seems ever to have been abolished. Ludicrous illustrations of this tendency were developed by the committee.

"During the Spanish war," writes Mr. Palmer in his report, "somebody's friend told somebody's cousin that somebody's aunt had heard someone say that a plot was on foot to dynamite the capitol. Thirty-eight extra policemen were added. They have remained ever since."

The Palmer committee was willing to concede the undeniability of having the capitol blown up. It is still a good house, albeit rather old-fashioned in some regards. The plumbing is not of the best or most modern, but then neither is that in Westminster Abbey or the Coliseum at Rome, and still those old houses are held standing, and the even regarded with distinguished respect by folks in London and Rome. It was conceded that dynamiting the capitol ought to be frowned upon.

Thirteen an Unlucky Number. Yet the committee felt a hesitation about paying forever those thirty-eight policemen to make sure that some reckless person with a dark complexion, Van Dyke beard and a tropic mustache, grabbed a man from Louisiana for whistling. The committee thought the police were overworking their ingenuity keeping busy, and ought to be quieted to watch themselves. So the two night watchmen will be abolished, and if the policemen get stolen, why, it will be their own fault.

The committee found that two night watchmen were charged to the folding room of the house. There are seventy-four policemen on duty at the capitol, and the committee, for the life of it, couldn't figure what these two night watchmen watched, unless it was the police. So it was decided to risk the long and diligently, and decided that if anybody came along and carried off the police while they weren't watching it might not be such a bad idea, anyhow.

On this point there is difference of opinion. The night watchmen feel that the policemen need watching. The committee, however, learned that the police have so little to do that they are put to it for spending the time.
