New York, April 12.—(Wall Street) market opened steady at an advance of 1 point on October but generally 1 to 4 points lower under overnight selling orders and while prices rallied to about the closing figures of last night on the old crop and to a new advance of 2 1/2 points on the new during the first few minutes, they weakened under more or less general realizing for over the approaching holidays.

Chicago, April 12.—Good rains in the spring crop belt had a bearish effect on wheat. Another influence on the side of lower prices came as a result of larger Australian and Russian offers at Liverpool. Conditions of growth in foreign countries were also reported as being satisfactory in general. Weakness here seemed most pronounced on the distant deliveries. The market opened 3/8 down to a shade up, May started at 88 1/8 to 3/8, a sixteenth higher to 1-8 1/4 off, fell to 87 3/4 and rallied to 88 1/8.

A Commission Governs Birmingham. The commission form of government has been instituted in Birmingham. Governor O'Neal putting into effect the law passed by the Alabama legislature and ratified by a large majority when the citizens were given the opportunity to vote on the proposition. The governor has appointed as commissioners Mr. James Weatherly and Judge A. O. Lane to serve with Mayor Cullpepper. He refused to appoint Mr. Harry Jones, who had strong backing on the ground that he was identified with the old administration and that the demand for a change "must be accepted as an emphatic and deliberate protest against existing conditions. Extravagance and mismanagement were the principal charges against the old administration, and the government to put in the hands of three leading citizens to secure economy and efficiency. The action of Birmingham, following so soon upon that of Memphis, puts two of the largest cities in the South under the new system, the workings of which will be observed with interest.—Baltimore Sun.
