Banquet to Twenty Odd Agents at the Southern Manufacturers' Club Begins an Auto Exhibition Given by The United States Motor Co.

The first automobile show ever to be held in Charlotte was initiated this afternoon by the United Motor Charlotte Company under the direction of Ham & Ross, by a banquet at the Southern Manufacturers' Club, the banquet being given to the twenty-odd agents of the company in the Carolinas.

The banqueters assembled at the club at 7 o'clock and short addresses were made by Messrs. W. F. Smith, eastern agent of the United Motor Company and Mr. C. R. Hayne, assistant supervisor of the eastern district. The banquet was wholly informal and was very enjoyable.

At 4 o'clock the second part of the program will begin at Ham & Ross' place on West Fourth street, where demonstration will be given of the operation and mechanism of the Maxwell and Columbia motor cars and the Sampson motor trucks. The machinery will be operated by an attached motor and will be uncovered so as to give visitors a chance to observe the machinery in every detail. Everything connected with the construction and the operation of the cars will be represented.

From 6 to 7 o'clock refreshments will be served and Richardson's orchestra will furnish music. Again from 8 to 10 the same orchestra will play and refreshments will again be served. The public is cordially invited to visit the place and see the demonstrations and be the guests of the company. Every attention will be given ladies who attend. The new offices of the company are finished, the floor of which is maple. ### MR. HUTCHISON'S REMAINS REACHED CHARLOTTE TODAY

The remains of Mr. Andrew C. Hutchison, sr., whose distressing death at Alta Vista, Va., shocked this community yesterday, reached Charlotte on the early morning train today. The body was taken to J. M. Harry & Co.'s undertaking establishment, and later to the residence on West Trade street. Accompanying the body were Mr. John Hutchison, son of deceased, and Messrs. Edgert and John S. Hutchison, brothers. Mrs. M. A. Hutchison, mother of deceased, and Mr. Chas. Ellis, brother-in-law, arrived from Greenville, S. C. this morning; also Mrs. Egbert Hutchison and children, from Mt. Holly.

Mr. John Hutchison reached Alta Vista last night. He talked with those who were associated with his father, and examined his papers. He found nothing that would suggest that his father had premeditated, for a moment, the desperate act of yesterday. "There were evidences in his room that father spent a restless night. The bed being tumbled up, but he was more himself yesterday morning than he had been for weeks. He went to a store and purchased some handkerchiefs, talking cheerfully with those who met. He went to his office and wrote two business letters. I could not find any other letters. A minute after the fatal shot was fired, never spoke. Death was instantaneous. I looked through his papers but found no evidence of him being in any special trouble. His business affairs were in better condition than for some time. He had not been well, I think the act was one of a moment's abstraction. There was no cause that has been filled with sympathy here to be a momentary. The funeral services will be held at 5 o'clock this afternoon at the residence, Rev. Dr. A. A. McGeachy, of the Second Presbyterian church, who was Mr. Hutchison's pastor officiating.

The pall bearers will be: Messrs. Paul Allen, W. C. Maxwell, C. W. Tillett, H. M. Victor, John C. McNeely, Thos. W. Bixon, Thomas Griffith, E. A. Smith.

The interment will be in Elmwood.

### Mrs. Annie Smith Died Yesterday

She was about 68 years of age and survived by two children, who are Mr. Erskine Smith, of this city, and Mrs. Bea Cunningham, of Pineville. The funeral services were held this morning at Harrison church in providence township, the funeral party leaving the city about 10 o'clock. The interment was in the churchyard at Harrison, where many of the relatives of the deceased had been buried.
