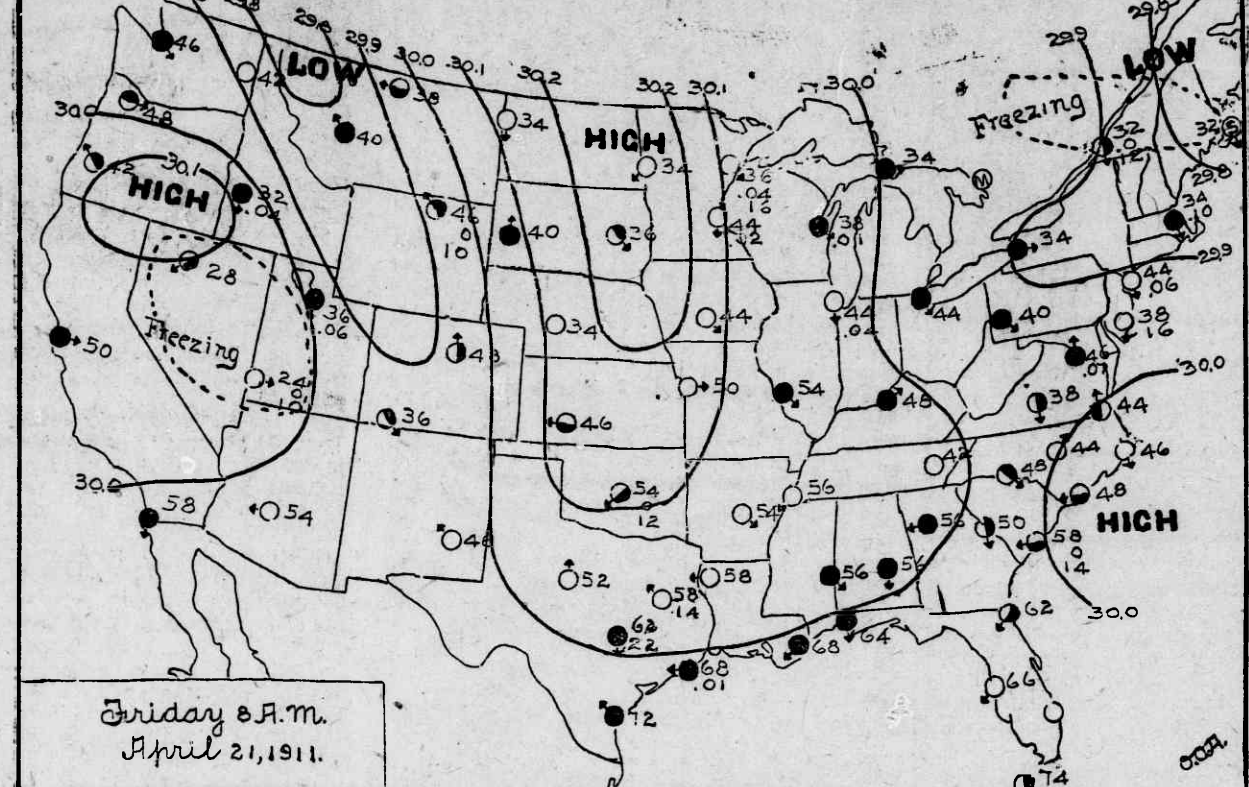

Gen. Parker Arrives.

New Orleans, April 21.—Gen. J. B. Parker, the veteran fighter, who with Gen. Lee Christmas, captured the town of Celba, Honduras, in the revolution against President Delesha, arrived yesterday from Honduras and will spend several weeks here. Gen. Parker declares that, in his opinion, Honduras has seen its last revolution, that he believes Gen. Bonilla will succeed in restoring peace and will give a harmonious administration to that country. He predicts the election of Bonilla next October.
