building the bridge. The petitioners, however, secured their wish only in part. They had asked in the same petition to have a bridge erected at Mt. Holly in similar manner, and with the co-operation of the Piedmont Traction Company, but the company's demands forbade any possibility of such move.



Dr. Hulten Preaches To Crowds in Va.

Attacks Saloons and Cigarette -Says They Are Relics of Barbarism — Quotes Dr. Broughton as to Evils of Cigarette Smoking.

Crowds are hearing Rev. Dr. Hulten of the First Presbyterian church of this city, in the series of revivalistic services he is holding in Roanoke, Va. Last Sunday morning he preached a sermon attacking the saloon and ci-

"Sunday's services at Calvary Bap-tist church marked a great era in the great revival being conducted by the Rev. Dr. H. H. Hulten, of the First Baptist church, Charlotte, N. C., for the reason that at all the services there were about forty conversions.
