Special Dispatches From Berlin

Berlin, June 3.—German Jewish organizations have undertaken a campaign against the unwritten military law, prohibiting Jews from becoming officers in the Prussian army. A resolution, unanimously adopted by two leading Jewish organizations, the Union of German Jews and the Central association of German citizens of Jewish faith, at a meeting at Frankfurt-on-Main reads:

"Contrary to the custom of all other civilized states, soldiers of the Jewish faith in the Prussian army are at a disadvantage, in the matter of promotion, as compared to Christian sons of Jewish parents. The assembly protests against this condition as unconstitutional and illegal, and expresses the hope that the competent authorities will succeed in abolishing this shameful and oppressive and unwelcome law of discrimination. This law, however, has never been enforced. The continued acquisition of German lands by Poles has called forth a strong demand that it be put into operation at once."

year. This occurs twenty-five years after the Prussian government inaugurated its great system of colonizing Germans in the Polish provinces, a policy that has cost something like \$90,000,000.

The efforts of the government have been partly counteracted by Polish activity in buying land. There are special Polish banks for assisting Poles in acquiring parcels of land, and their work has been so effective that for some years most of the land bought by the Prussian settlement commission for dividing up among German peasants has been acquired from Germans themselves. In order to enable the commission to carry forward its settlement plans in a systematic way and extend the borders of German settlements already established, the diet, or Prussian legislative assembly, passed in 1908 a law permitting the commission to dispossess Polish landholders, within certain limits, under the law of eminent domain. This law, however, has never been enforced. The continued acquisition of German lands by Poles has called forth a strong demand that it be put into operation at once.

Interesting Bill Introduced.

Washington, June 3.—Representative Small has introduced bills appropriating money to be paid to legal representatives of Hon. Jessie R. Stubbs, of Williamston, and Col. T. C. Fuller, of Raleigh, who were elected to congress from North Carolina in the latter part of 1865 to serve as representatives in the 39th congress, but who were not permitted to do so. Harry W. Stubbs, of Williamston, is in the city, and with Messrs. Small and S. A. Ashe, have been investigating the records and looking into the law bearing on the case.

Those men, Messrs. Stubbs and Fuller, were elected at a special election called by Governor Holden. But the state was denied representation hereafter.

Messrs. Small and Ashe think the claims represented in the Small bills are valid. The supreme court says that the Confederate states were never out of the union. These men were duly elected.
