## Bauswine's Wildness Lost Game for Hornets

Greensboro, N. C., June 19.—After pitching a magnificent game this afternoon Bauswine handed the locals the game in the seventh inning. Up till this time he had been going good but in this inning he walked three men after which he allowed two strikes netting the locals five runs. The visitors had the game tucked away safely but the performance of the visiting twirler undid all his work and of the team behind him. It was clearly the hitting of Doak and Corwin that saved the game for the locals each being credited with 3 hits out of 4 times up and the singles of these two men in the seventh bringing over enough runs to tie the score and then they need over with the two winning runs. Had the visitors played for rain as they should have done there would have been a different tale to tell but since they failed to do this the locals took advantage of it and the inning was just over when the five runs were made by the locals.

After walking the three men Bauswine struck out the next two batters that faced him and with two strikes on Doak and the bases full he laced out a single which proved the undoing of the Hornets. After the winning runs were made the manager told Walters to strike out and although the ball was three feet away from the plate he swung at ten regardless. Malcolmson missed the third strike but Umpire O'Brien ruled that the batter was out which ended the game.

In the fourth the visitors took what looked like enough to win the game, after Gross and Courts had gone out Wofford doubled while Siegfried was safe on an error of Richard. Malcolmson then hit the ball for a home run which netted the visitors three runs.
