Malcolmson Wins Game for Hornets

Winston-Salem, N. C., June 24.—Malcolmson won the game for the Hornets yesterday afternoon, getting two home runs were driven in as a result their six runs. Had it not been for his offensive stick work the game would have been more interesting than it was. Scheesley was in masterful form and held the locals safe at all times. He was especially invincible when there were men on bases and his meat runs and would only give up seven scattered hits during the whole affair. He pitched the finest game seen on the local diamond this year and it was his pitching that was the real feature of the game.

In the fourth Howard got gracious and walked. Cutts and Wofford and Seigfried beat out a would-be sacrifice. Malcolmson then proceeded to break things up and put one over the fence causing four runs to count. In the second Cutts walked, Wofford singled, and Seigfried sacrificed and Malcolmson, who followed, brought Cutts home on a sacrifice fly to the outfield. In the eighth he managed to count one more for the visitors, knocking his second home run of the game.

In the second the Twins shoved one over on a base on balls to Gates, an intended bait by Stewart, who turned it into a hit, a single by Daley, and Seigfried's error of Clemens' ground-er. In the ninth the Twins also annexed another.

As usual the fielding of Agnew was out of the ordinary, while a catch of McMillan in center helped to make things interesting. His catch was one of the fastest pieces of work seen on the local diamond this year.

Stewart relieved Howard in the fourth and all the Hornets could do with him was the one run scored on Malcolmson's home run.
