## INTEREST IN LIGHTWEIGHT RING BATTLE

### Thousands Crowd Into Arena at San Francisco to See Ad Wolgast and Owen Moran Battle for Championship of the World.

### Both Men in Pink of Condition and Confident of Victory—Weather Ideal—Betting Favors Wolgast at 10 to 6 Odds.

 San Francisco, July 4.—The American and British pugilists, opponents of the ring this afternoon when Ad Wolgast and Owen Moran climbed through the ropes for their second battle for the lightweight championship. To each battle, the fight is a deep rooted, significant significance by its own. The union, a man born by Moran was sent him by a mirror to England who are confident that tonight he will wear the lightweight crown. Wolgast has carried the bedraggled stars and stripes around his waist in many a hard won battle and feels that on this day they cannot but bring him victory.

Hours before the contest gathered about the arena gates, struggling for a position of advantage in the rush for the bleacher seats. The holders of reserved seats followed close on the heels of the bleacherites and when Referee Jack Welch called the fighters to the center of the ring the arena was jammed by a close packed mob of cheering spectators.

It would be hard to find a more closely matched pair than the champion and the challenger. Moran's blonde head overtops Wolgast's black hair by less than half an inch as they listened to the instructions of the referee. Less than half pound was their difference in weight. In condition there was naught to choose between them. Neither had the slightest trouble in making the weight, 123 pounds, just before they entered the ring. Moran's skin was as pink and clear as a child's while Wolgast's body, tanned like an Indian during his stay in the mountains, showed condition in every line.

Both were confident. Wolgast had declared that he would take the fight to his opponent in every round and was supremely certain that his tearing, punishing blows would wear the Englishman down.

Moran had stated that if the champion left an opening to him such as he gave Memsie and Burns, one well timed right cross to the jaw would make a new lightweight champion.

There was little change in the betting before the battle. Wolgast retained a to heavy favorite at ten to six with plenty of Moran supporters in evidence when they found that the expected drop to 2 to 1 did not take place. Small wagers were made at 10 to 9 that Moran would be on his feet at the end of 20 rounds.

Wolgast began to plan future matches before he entered the ring. He declared he had been offered more money for a bout with Packey McFarland than a lightweight ever drew. He refused to name the promoter of the match but said McFarland had agreed to make 133 pounds four hours before the fight and that if he could get concessions he demanded in regard to the fight he would accept the offer.

## GERMAN HONORS STARS AND STRIPES.

 Kiel, Germany, July 4.—The imperial yacht Hohenzollern and the German fleet in common with the visiting American war vessels, dressed ship today in honor to the American Fourth. The Hohenzollern and the German battleships flew the stars and stripes from the main top.

At noon the entire German and American fleets fired a national salute of twenty-one guns. American Commander Countz, his flag lieutenant and commanders were entertained at luncheon by Prince Henry of Prussia, and the Princes at the castle.

The date of the departure of Emperor William for his Norwegian trip has not been definitely set.

The delay is attributed generally to the Moroccan complication. The official explanation is that it is due to reports of bad weather in Norwegian waters.
