In the morning game Sheesley and Wolfe were pitted. The game started out nicely and gave signs of being one of the most exciting of the season until the fateful 7th was reached. It was in this chapter that the visiting pitcher weakened and the locals hitched his little goat up and drove off with the game. Hits coupled with errors in the 7th gave the local 3 runs. The Hornets miscued 4 times. Manager Cross at third transgressing twice. The locals evaded up in the matter of error making but the local errors were not as costly as those of the visitors.

In the afternoon game Bausewine was touched up without mercy. The Electricians culled the grand total of 16 safe swats from the delivery of the heavy citizen from the Tar Heel state. In the fifth spasm of play the locals hit on the Hornet twirler for a bunch of safeties that materialized into 3 runs and the game.

Hamburg, Germany, July 5.—Headed by Prince Henry of Prussia, 37 German and 28 English participants started today on the annual Prince Henry automobile endurance test.

The course for this year starts here and follows a devious way through Germany to Hamburg. At that port the automobiles entered in the tour will be shipped to Southampton, England. There they will again take to the road, proceeding to Edinburgh and returning to London. Among the English cars entered is one by the Duke of Connaught. Chicago Faces Another Scorcher

Chicago, Ill., July 5.—Chicago faced another record-breaking hot day with no relief in sight before Friday, according to the prediction of the official forecaster.

At 6 o'clock the temperature registered 84, one point below that of yesterday at the same hour. At seven o'clock the mercury rose to 86, which is one degree hotter than the record for yesterday at the same hour. At 8 o'clock the thermometer stood at 89, the same as at 8 o'clock Tuesday. At 9 o'clock the mercury climbed to 93, 2 points higher than the same hour yesterday.
