No Appropriation For City Nurses

Finance Committee of The Board of Aldermen Votes not to Make \$1,000 Appropriation Now for Paying Two Nurses for City Poor.

The finance committee of the board of aldermen met last night in the mayor's office at the city hall and was presided over by Mayor Bland. The committee by a vote of 3 to 2 decided not to appropriate \$1,000 at the present time to pay the expenses of two nurses for the poor of the city. The board of aldermen, it will be remembered, made a recommendation to that effect at a recent meeting with the understanding that the Woman's Club would provide an equal sum for the same purpose.

Mrs. Gordon Finger, Mrs. C. E. Platt, chairman of the civics department of the Woman's Club, and Dr. Annie L. Alexander, appeared before the committee in the interest of the matter, which was championed by Mr. E. S. Williams, of the committee and favored by Mr. Thompson. Messrs. Carr, Phifer and Sifford, however, were of the opinion that it would not be wise to make the appropriation until it could be learned what the city's income would be from the new tax assessment.
