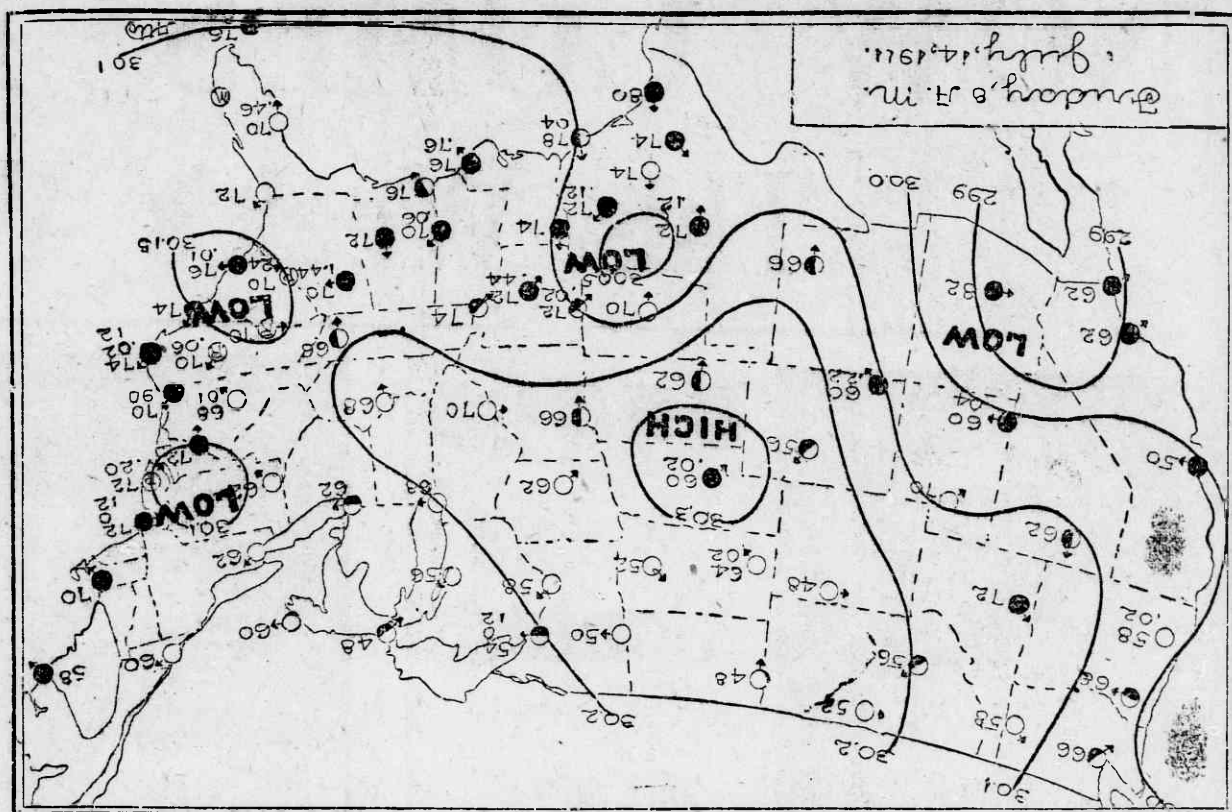

New York Cotton

New York, July 14.—The cotton market opened steady at a decline of 3 to 6 points in response to slightly disappointing cables and reports of further showers in the Western belt.

New York Stock Market

New York, July 14.—Slight advances were in the majority at the opening of the stock market today. American Smelting, Erie and Northern Pacific were the only stocks in the more active list to show signs of heaviness.

Chicago Grain

Chicago, July 14.—With weather favorable in the Northwest, the spring crop is nearing harvest, sentiment regarding wheat today was bearish. Sellers, however, seemed disposed to be cautious, figuring that the bulls could not afford to let the market break very far.

Cattle Market

Chicago Cattle. Chicago, July 14.—Cattle, receipts estimated at 15,000, market dull, weak.

The buying was not aggressive and trading was quiet during the late forenoon, but prices held very steady and at midday held up to the high point of the morning, or about 5 to 10 points over the closing figures of yesterday.

Secondary prices were not altered much except in the case of oil specialties, notably the fertilizer group. Canadian Pacific, Virginia-Carolina Chemical and American Cotton Oil advanced 1 and Virginia Iron 2 points.

The strength of the cash situation had a tendency to hoist corn. Besides the weather was reported as warming up west and southwest. September opened 5 3/8 to 5 7/8 higher at 68 3/4 to 67, touched 66 5/8 and then rose to 67 1/4.

Reports that it was raining or showering in Texas again this afternoon, were followed by rather an easier turn in the market during the early afternoon, but while there was some southern and local selling, trade demand was in evidence on the decline and after selling off to within 3 or 4 points of last night's close, the market steadied up 3 or 4 points on renewed covering.

Trading in stocks this morning was on a still smaller basis than yesterday, but a firm tone was maintained. Dealings were confined to an unusual small number of issues and operators made no attempts to bring about a pronounced movement in either direction.

There was an easy provision market on account of a decline at the yards. Initial sales were 2 1/2 to 10 cents down with January options 15.65 for pork, 8.40 for lard and 8.15 for ribs.

Close New York Spots.

New York, July 14.—Cotton spots closed quiet, unchanged; middling uplands 14.25; middling gulf 14.50; sales 8,001.

Bonds were steady. A sudden spurt of an oint in Southern Pacific to 123, attracted considerable attention in view of the nervousness of the general speculation. Half of this gain was soon lost but either movement affected the general list, which remained virtually at a standstill.

New Orleans, July 14.—Cotton futures opened steady at a decline of 2 to 7 points on poor cables and a good weather map. The market had little selling in the early trading and acted oversold. Sentiment around the ring was bearish but bears preferred to take profits at every opportunity rather than to increase their lines of shorts.
