## Hornets Revenged For Two Defeats By Taking Last Game

The biggest thing about the game at the Park last evening was the crowd. The grandstand and bleachers were crowded to witness the local defeat of the two victorious Anderson team by the score of 3 to 0. Hankie was pitched for the locals and was in the best form that he has displayed for several weeks and had no trouble in keeping the Electricians from the counting pan. The nearest thing that resembled a run for the visitors was the reaching of second three times, once by Kelly in the sixth on the error by the locals when Lave forgot to get his legs together (?) on a hot hopper, and again in the ninth when he singled with two down and waited for Yount to walk. In the eighth one of the longest hits ever registered on the home diamond was unearched when Childers leaned up again one of Hankie's benets and drove the pill to the boards in left center and was held on second base by the excellent retrieving of one McMillan. This was the prettiest play of the game and brought forth great applause for the fast little centerfielder of the Hornets.

Kuhl, a new twirler that Kelly sprung on the locals this trip of the best, was pitched against Hankie. This particular elongated citizen of Anderson proved to be a good twirler—above the average of the league by far—and had the visitors given him any support of the decent variety the score might have been different. In the very first jump from the box McMillan hit sharply to right for the Keystone and Agnew hit to short who threw to first to catch the runner, but McCoy dropped the ball and McMillan raced home. Agnew took second on the play and third when Garman hit to that base and the tall and loose guarder errorred. With Cross at the bat, Garman made a break for second, Brannon threw to catch him, and Agnew raced home. Cross then popped up and the next two men died the miserable death by fanning. In the sixth inning the locals made the only other run of the game on Garman's hit and a sacrifice by Cross mixed with a walk and a hit by Wofford with the timely single of Seigfried to center. This was all the run-getting for either side.

The game, as the two preceding ones, was rather listless and devoid of special features. Both teams showed a little more of the pepper stuff and the grand stand seemed to be spurred on by the two run lead that the locals snatched in the early innings of the play and kept things hot for the players—mostly the visitors and Brannon, who was desirous for Hankie to "put one over."

Hankie did and so did the rooters "put one over" on the plucky little Anderson catcher.

Leibrich must have had another bad day with his eyes, as he was far off on balls and strikes and the Electricians would have fared far better had he again retired to the club house as he once did in Greenville along with Daddy Cross. It was the sorriest piece of umpiring that Leibrich has pulled off at the home diamond yet. In the seventh McCoy seemed to take the task of captain upon his shoulders and proceeded to deliver a speech right in the middle of the diamond. The Ump's warned the orator that if he was very anxious to speak he would be glad to hire him a ball but that he did not have time to hear him deliver the said speech right at that present time. McCoy was full up and vented his feelings as to a decision on a close double-play at first. The Ump's chased the initial sacked and he was replaced by Corbett, who took care of the bag in good style and pulled down a liner from the hat of Garman that would have meant a run.

The playing of McMillan in center was of the first order and his work in chasing up the long drive of Childers was phenomenal. Hankie was in good shape for the twirling stunt and worked out a pretty game, only allowing the visitors four scattered hits.
