PRIZE FIGHT INTERRUPTED.

Chicago, Ill., July 29.—One hundred and fifty men and boys who left this city this morning to witness a prize fight between Danny Goodman and Jack Roberts, lightweights, in an open field across the Indiana border, fled through corn fields and brambles in order to escape a levy of Indiana deputy sheriffs who swooped down on the affair.

The fight had gone four and one-half rounds when the constabulary interfered. The promoters of the bout tried to stage it in four different places and each time were forced to suspend by the appearance of deputies. The arena was lighted by candles held in the hands of spectators.

The principals fled from the ring clad only in their fighting trunks, and had to borrow clothes before returning to Chicago.
