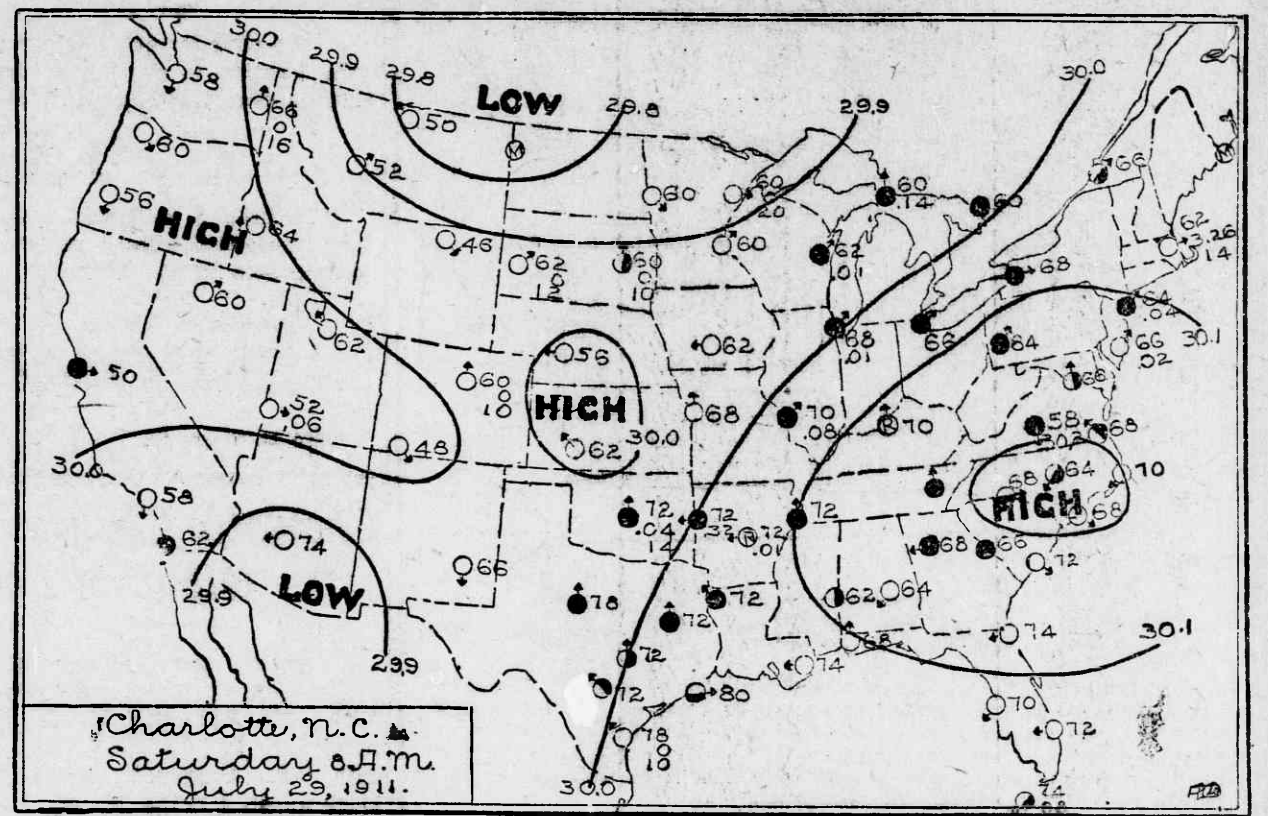


Late Market Reports Complete Cotton--Stocks--Grain--Provisions--Miscellaneous

Observations taken at 8 a. m. 75th meridian time. Isobars or continuous lines; pass through points of equal air pressure. Isotherms, or dotted lines, pass through points of equal temperature; they will be drawn only for zero, freezing, 90 degrees and 100 degrees. Symbols indicate state of weather: ☉ clear; ☁ partly cloudy; ☉☁ cloudy ☉ rain; ☉ snow; ☉ report missing. Arrows fly with the wind. First figure, minimum temperature for past 12 hours; second, 24-hour rainfall, if it equals .01 inch; third, wind velocity of 10 miles per hour or more.

Mr. Harrison Laid to Rest

Southern Power Company Closes its Office as Tribute to Mr. Harrison—Large Crowd at Funeral.

Several hundred citizens of Charlotte representing the best social and commercial interests of Charlotte, paid the last tribute of respect to Mr. L. C. Harrison, whose death has so grieved the city.

The services were conducted at the First Presbyterian church, by Rev. Dr. A. A. McGeachy, of the Second Presbyterian church.

The service consisted of Scripture reading and the hymns, "Asleep in Jesus" and "How Firm a Foundation." The church was filled with distressed and sorrowing friends.

Immediately following the remains were a number of the Southern Power Company officials, with Mr. W. S. Lee at the head.

The family came next and then a long line of special friends.

Fifty of sixty of the power company men, representing every department of the company, occupied seats on the right.

Beautiful flowers in wagon-loads profusion, came from friends in North and South Carolina, especially hand-some designs coming from the Power Company.

High Tribute. For the first time since the Southern Power Company was organized its offices were closed today during the funeral.

"This is a sad day for our office," said Mr. Lee. "This is the first time since our company was organized that the management has ever closed the office."

We held Mr. Harrison in affectionate regard and esteemed him as a man especially valuable to the company.

WORLD'S VISIBLE SUPPLY. New Orleans, July 28.—Secretary Hester's statement of the world's visible supply of cotton made up from special cable and telegraphic advices shows the total visible to be 1,846,947 against 1,958,768 last week, 1,915,580 last year.

Of this the total of American cotton is 914,070 against 1,004,768 last week and 1,022,580 last year and of all other kinds, including Egypt, Brazil, India, etc. 932,877 against 954,000 last week and 892,000 last year.

The total world's visible supply of cotton shows a decrease compared with last week of 111,798, a decrease compared with last year of 68,610 and a decrease compared with year before last of 65,719.

Of the world's visible supply of cotton there is now afloat and held in Great Britain and Continental Europe 1,047,000 against 954,000 last year, in India 498,000 against 565,000 last year and in the United States 301,947 against 339,000 last year.
