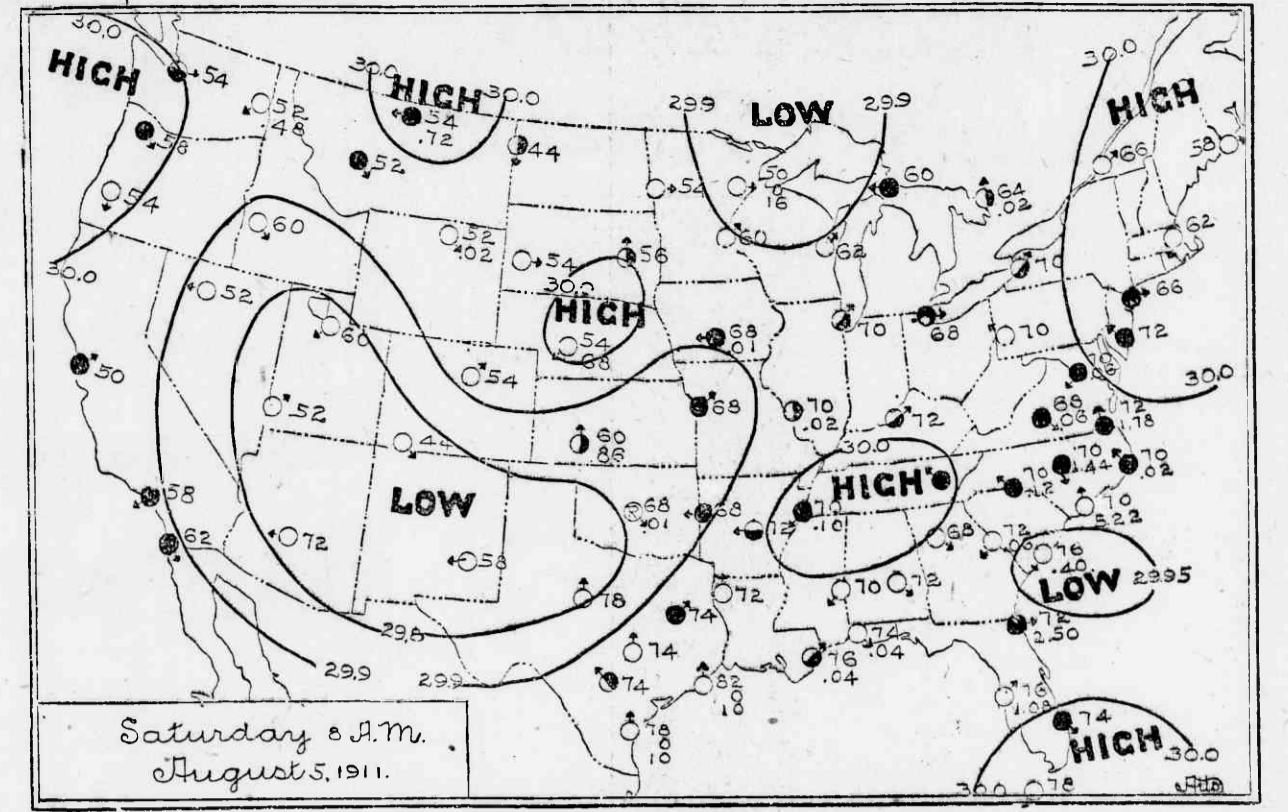

New York Stock Market

New York, Aug. 5.—Wall Street—Prices again tended sharply downward on large offerings at the opening of the stock market today. Union Pacific made a maximum decline of 1-1/2 and on large blocks U. S. Steel, St. Paul, Reading, Great Northern, Lehigh Valley, General Electric and numerous other issues declined from large fractions to a point and a half.

James Johnson Gets Ten Years

Spartanburg, S. C., Aug. 5.—James Johnson, alias Portland Ned, was sentenced this morning to serve ten years in the state penitentiary for robbery. He is just out of the federal prison at Atlanta, where he served seven years for robbing the postoffice at Enoree, S. C., the same night in which the Enoree Manufacturing Company, for which his latest sentence was imposed, Johnson was placed on trial yesterday and pleaded his own case, asking that he be given a chance. His robberies were committed in November, 1902. He obtained \$10,000.

Want Lemons Protected.

San Diego, Cal., Aug. 5.—The San Diego chamber of commerce has telegraphed to Senator Works a strong protest against the removal of the present tariff of one and one-half cents per pound on lemons. Many fruit growers and business men also sent like telegrams.
