

# Will Arizona and New Mexico be Admitted to Statehood; Vital Issue

Washington, D. C., Aug. 7.—A poll of the senate indicates that the joint resolution, admitting the territories of Arizona and New Mexico to statehood, will pass the upper house with a margin of 75 to 25 today for consideration. Only some unforeseen contingency, say the backers of the measure, can defeat the favorable legislation on all sides.

So sure are the backers of the measure that success awaits them in the senate that large delegations from New Mexico and Arizona are today preparing to celebrate the history-making legislation on an extensive scale. Conferences with their respective delegates, Ralph Henry Cameron, of Arizona, and William H. Andrews, of New Mexico, are in order; and everywhere about the hotel lobbies groups of enthusiastic Westerners are discussing the optimistic outlook of tomorrow.

separately for separately, for a long time defeated their efforts to gain admission to statehood.

To obviate discussion upon that moot question, the recall of the judiciary, the United States senate, in its vote tomorrow upon the joint statehood resolution, will tack on an amendment providing that the recall provision of the Arizona constitution must be construed as not applying to the judiciary. This amendment must be agreed to by the people of Arizona before they get statehood, but as their constitution provides for its amendment at any time within three months they will probably interpose no objection. Statehood at the present session is the wish of every one in the territory, and the recall of the judiciary can be left out or put back, as the majority wishes, once statehood is attained.

The Arizona constitution is modeled largely after the Oregon constitution, and is admitted to be, by those who have examined it, the most modern of all the present day popular govern-

### HISTORY IN TORN LETTERS.

Harrington, Del., Aug. 5.—Stories of civil war time troubles in Delaware are graphically told on scraps of paper and envelopes found yesterday by J. H. Griffith in the garret of an abandoned farm house near here.

Scattered over the floor were many letters full of historic facts, many of them torn in pieces. On one piece of paper measuring 1.2 by 2.2 inches is a promissory note of 197 words written in a remarkably fine hand with a quill. The note is drawn to George Melvin for two pounds and ten shillings and bears the date of December 10, 1765. On an old envelope was a postoffice address of Clark's Corner, the name by which Harrington was formerly known. Some of the old correspondence is especially interesting and the collection will be presented to the Delaware Historical Society.

Wilmington, Del., Aug. 5.—Barrow Guest, Hugh T. Budd, George R. Miller, Hugh Morris and David Snellenburg, a committee appointed by manufacturers of the state to consider the apparent conflicts in the new manufacturers' tax law, have made their report, and it is probable that the new law will be attacked on the ground of unconstitutionality at the September term of court.

The new law bases the tax on the value of the real and personal property used in production as well as on the value of the raw material used. It is thought that under the law canners of the state will be taxed. Manufacturers strongly object to the law.

Maps and statistics of Arizona and New Mexico, the sister territories that will learn after today's senate vote is taken whether they have become states.

The cause of the long delay in admitting New Mexico and Arizona to statehood lies in the ultra-progressive constitution of the latter. Exception was taken by the legislators in Washington to the Arizona provision for the recall of the judiciary, and in many quarters the initiative, referendum and recall features in general were also viewed with suspicion. The antagonism that these progressive features called forth, coupled with a refusal of certain members of congress as to permit the admission of either territory

ment "experiments." It provides for the initiative, referendum and the recall, which is extended to include the judiciary of the territory. It was this last feature that President Taft opposed, and while he has been committed all along to statehood for the two territories, he insisted he could not and would not approve this extreme constitutional provision, and it is to be cut out to secure presidential sanction.

New Mexico goes almost as far to the other extreme in her constitution. It is a staid, practically unamendable, fundamental law, containing a variety of the best features from the constitutions of other states, with the exception of the method of dealing with corporations, in which it stands alone among the states. The New Mexico constitution provides for a corporation commission of three elected by the people and having direct supervision over all corporations doing business in the new state. The peculiar feature consists in an automatic transfer of matters before the commission to the supreme court of the territory in cases where a corporation fails to carry out the instructions of the commission within a time specified. This, it is claimed by the drafters of the constitution, will do away with the intermediate delay which can be brought about in other states by injunctions sued out by corporations.

Nominally New Mexico is republican by about 5,000 majority, while Arizona is about equally divided between the two parties, with the democrats having a slight advantage. Arizona, however, has a large number of progressives in both parties, and contains greater proportion of American-born citizens than does New Mexico, where probably 50 per cent. of the people are of Spanish descent, although natives of the territory, descendants of the early Spanish settlers.

There is a spirit of concession among all elements in congress, and whereas a few weeks ago, it was practically decided that the question of statehood could wait until the next session, just as well as not, the territories jointly waged such a campaign for immediate statehood, that it probably will be given at this session.
