

Geo. Stephens Co. Begins Operations

Development Scheme Planned by Local Company, For Developing Myers Park Into Residential Suburbs Launched Today.

This week will see the property of the George Stephens Company on the market. This property, as the public knows, is in the general development of what is locally known as Myers Park, southeast of the city.

The Park property consists of 1200 acres. It is bounded on the north by the Providence road, on the southeast by the Belt road from the south, and on the west by Sugar Creek. The bottom land by the creek will be reserved for park purposes.

Prizes for Names. The streets have not been named. The company is to offer prizes for names for the streets, a list to be sent in, names selected by the company and those sending them (accepted names) to be awarded prizes.

Car Station. The first car station will be in the center of the village, at the junction of the Providence and Belt roads.

Park Drive. A broad boulevard will run parallel with the creek. This will be opened up the grading being started.

North Section. The North Section of the property will be first to be put on the market. There will be such restriction in the sales as will prevent crowding of houses close together.
