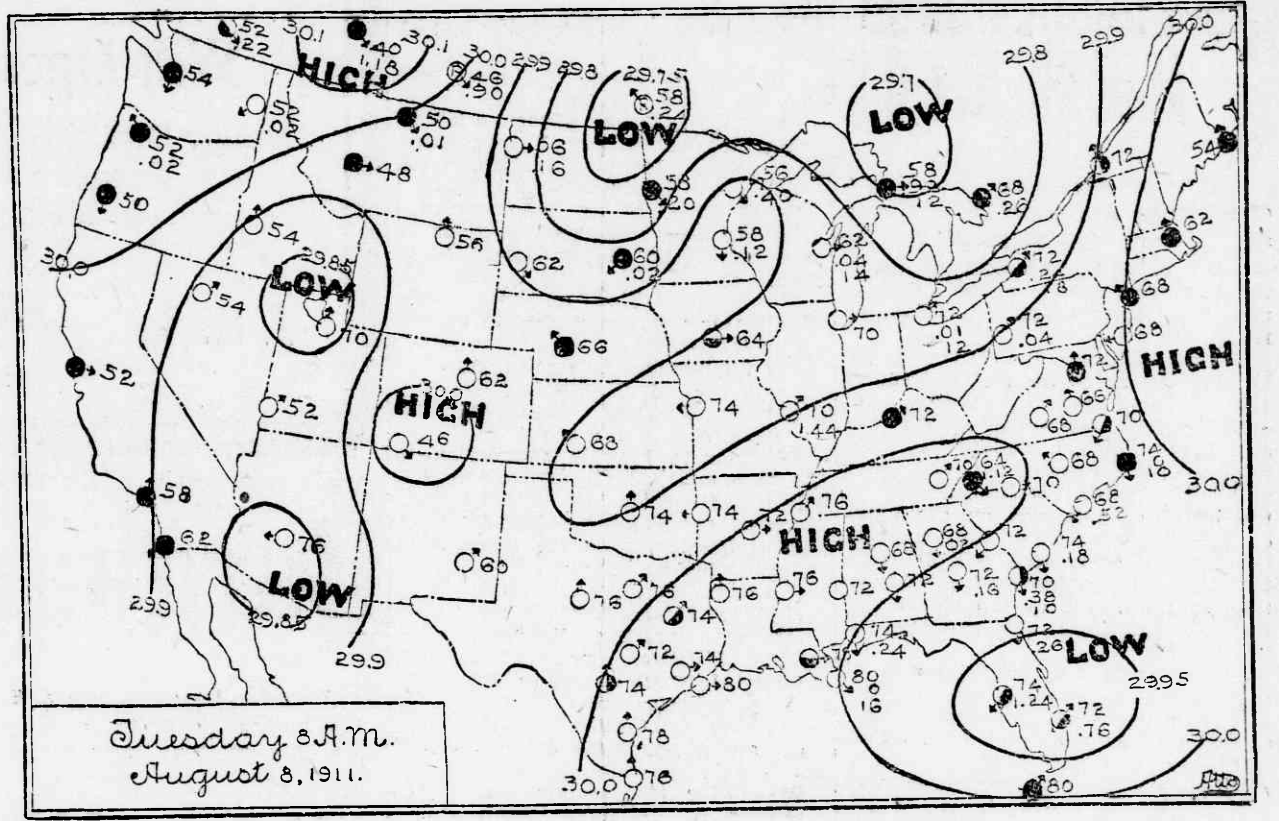

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New York Stock Market

New York, Aug. 8.—Wall Street—Guided by London, where prices in the international list ranged from a half point to one and a half above parity, the local stock market opened active and strong.

Stocks were offered freely on the average and a large part of the initial gains were soon wiped out, some issues going under yesterday's close. There was moderate pressure against the Hill issues, St. Paul, the coals, Pennsylvania and Atchison.

The market seemed to fall of its own weight but received material assistance from the short accounts which became bolder as prices declined.

The market closed heavy. The list declined heavily in the final hour but did not reach the previous high level. This was followed by short covering and some buying with rallies of 1 to 1 1/2 in Union Pacific, Northern Pacific, Great Northern, preferred, Reading, United States Steel, Amalgamated Copper and other actives.

New York Cotton

New York, Aug. 8.—Cotton futures opened steady at the decline, 11 to 19 points down. Cables were very unfavorable and private dispatches from across the water stated that this was due to the fact that the railway strike was interfering with business.

Chicago Grain

Chicago, Aug. 8.—Not nearly as much buying enthusiasm was shown in the wheat market as had been expected. Instead of a good deal of commission selling developed and there was a decided tendency for prices to sag.

Heavy speculative selling of the May option weakened all the future of corn. September opened 1-8 lower to 1-3 up at 64 3/8-8 to 64 7/8 and declined to 64 1/2.

London Stock

London, Aug. 8.—American securities opened steady and from 1-2 to 1 1/2 points above parity today. Prices improved improved for a time but near the end of the first hour the market reacted under profit-taking and at noon was easier with values from 3-8 to 1 1/4 above yesterday's New York closing.

Flash—Following from Brownwood, Texas: "Consider crop as a whole doing fine. Just the weather needed for four weeks. One good rain last month will exceed my estimate. This and Comanche county will make as much as West Texas last year. To look at the crop last year, the now you would expect as much. Insect damage of no importance yet hot and dry weather will keep them down."

Following from Cordill, at Charlotte, N. C.: "Albany, Macon, Augusta to Greenwood, crops perfect, large and heavily fruited, perfect color, laid by clean, Greenwood to Spartanburg, excellent. Spartanburg to Charlotte, good but rather small, around Charlotte good rains fell in this section vastly improving local conditions, as unit outlook could not be better."

Flash—The first bale of South Carolina which was shipped to F. W. Wagner & Co. Saturday from Barnwell. The bale classed good middling and weighed 255 pounds.
