# ENSIGN YOUNG FOUND TO BE IRRESPONSIBLE

Washington, Aug. 19.—Ensign R. S. Young, Jr., of Concord, N. C., who recently disappeared from the destroyer Perkins, leaving a note that he contemplated suicide and was later found by his father in New York city, has been declared by a naval medical board of survey at Norfolk, Va., to be mentally irresponsible for his act.

The navy department has ordered the young officer to the government hospital for the insane at Washington for observation and treatment. Previous to his disappearance Ensign Young was under orders for court-martial on charges of absence without leave.

He was examined by the naval physicians to determine whether he should be prosecuted on these charges. When found by his father, he was taken to a North Carolina sanitarium and removed from there to Norfolk for the examination.

### BUMPER APPLE CROP EXPECTED THIS YEAR

Boston, Aug. 19.—New York state and the middle west have a bumper apple crop this year for export shipments according to the bulletin of the Boston Chamber of Commerce just issued.

The far west, Virginia and New England have fallen off somewhat but New York and the middle west bring this year's average up to half as large again as last year's. Michigan, Missouri, Arkansas, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas have 75 per cent more apples than last year. Oregon and Washington have fallen off. Colorado and Utah have slightly heavier crops.

Washington, Aug. 19.—President Taft today issued orders that the bones of all enlisted men recognized from the battleship Maine should be brought from Havana to the United States on a battleship. The president takes the position that the enlisted men who went down with the Maine are entitled to all the honor that the United States can give them.

Mr. Taft read a newspaper dispatch from Havana today that remains of victims would be brought to the United States on a collier. He took prompt steps to forestall such action.
