LIGHT MONOPOLY LOSES OUT

Wilmington, Del., Aug. 26.—Having enjoyed a monopoly in the furnishing of electric light for all the city buildings for several years, the Wilmington & Philadelphia Traction company was somewhat startled when the city council decided to do away with electric light and substitute gas. The contract for this work is to be awarded to the Wilmington Gas company, which will install all the fixtures and pay for the upkeep. It was costing the city about \$2800 a year for electric light and the public buildings committee estimated it \$1200 a year by using gas. The contract is for three years.
