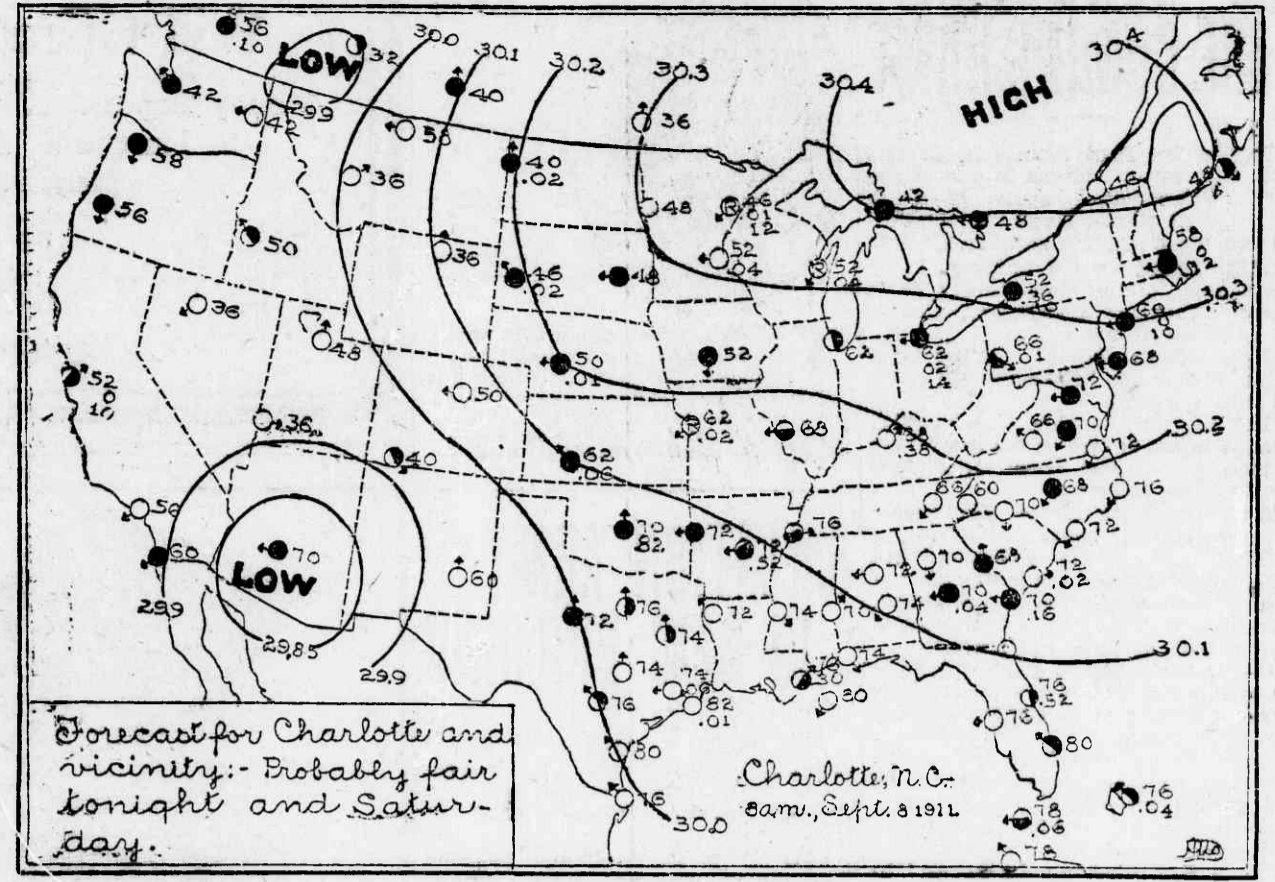

New York Cotton

New York, Sept. 8.—The cotton market opened steady at a decline of 3 points on October, but generally 1 point higher and sold 9 to 12 points above the closing figures of yesterday.

A reaction of 6 or 7 points from the early high level as a result of realizing by recent buyers was followed by renewed firmness toward midday with the active months selling about 10 to 12 points net higher on continued bull support and rather more aggressive buying through commission houses which was attributed to reports of army worm damage in the eastern belt and the failure of the ginners to create a bearish sentiment.

Estimated receipts of cotton at ports today 25,000 bales, against 20,000 last week and 19,458 last year. For the week 140,000 bales against 179,270 last week and 54,746 last year.

New York Cotton

New Orleans, La., Sept. 8.—Cotton futures opened steady at an advance of 1 to 3 points on good cables and continued reports of widespread damage by the army worm in north Mississippi and north Alabama, where it was claimed prospects of a large yield have been seriously cut in two.

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London Stock

London, Sept. 8.—American securities opened steady and a fraction lower today. Later light covering carried a few stocks above parity. At noon the market was steady with prices ranging from 1-4 above to 3-8 below yesterday's New York closing.

Chicago Grain

Chicago, Sept. 8.—Bearish cables today made the wheat market here weak. Liverpool sent word of a probable increase in Russian and Indian shipments. Supplies from the Argentine proved also quite liberal.

New York Stock Market

New York, Sept. 8.—(Wall Street)—The decline in stocks was continued in the early trading today. Several new low records for the year were made including Baltimore & Ohio which receded 3-4 to 96 1-4, Denver & Rio Grande, preferred, and Missouri Pacific, each of which lost 1-2.

Movements of stocks were unsettled and the tone of the market was feverish during the morning. A renewal of yesterday's selling gave the list a heavy appearance but this was at times offset by sharp rallies and prices swerved back and forth irregularly.

Offerings of stocks diminished and the list rallied feebly and became dull. London's sales today were estimated at 15,000 shares. Forecast of the bank statement indicated a net cash for the banks of \$8,500,000 from sub-treasury operations and the interior movement.
