to give up Tripoli. The Turkish cabinet together with the parliament is preparing a definite answer to give to Italy. Meanwhile adjust the population to remain quiet and respect the Italians.

Day Closed Quiet.

"This is the message received by the local authorities from Constantinople. It had been expected that today would be filled with the scenes of war but the contrary was the case and the impetuous African night settled down on a town that was outwardly serene."

May Reach Agreement.

Chiasso, Switzerland, Oct. 2. It is reported that on Sunday Admiral Aubrey was suddenly ordered to postpone the bombardment of Tripoli as there were signs of a possibility of reaching an understanding with Turkey through the intervention of certain powers, thus averting a continuation of the war.

Rumor Tripoli Occupied.

LONDON, Oct. 2.—A correspondent at Jaffa telegraphs this message today:

"I am informed by one of the crew of the British cruiser Aboukir, which has arrived here that the vessel received a wireless dispatch stating that Tripoli had been occupied by the Italians."

Japan Neutral.

It is announced that Japan will issue a proclamation declaring her strict neutrality in the Italy-Turkish struggle.

Russia Neutral

St. Petersburg, Oct. 2.—The Russian declaration of neutrality is being drafted and will be submitted to Emperor Nicholas at Yalt. It will not be issued for a week.

Telegraph Broken.

Marseilles, France, Oct. 2.—Telegraphic communication with Tripoli by way of Malta has been interrupted since 4 o'clock yesterday morning.

Church Sends Minister.

New York, Oct. 2.—The trustees of Old Trinity church here have sent one of their ministers, the Rev. William Wilkinson, to assist in the work of relief at Austin, Pa. Dr. Wilkinson, who is known as the "Bishop of Wall Street" is under orders to represent Trinity corporation and the Episcopal church, reporting to the local clergy of the Episcopal church for all help he can give and to stay as long as he is needed.

Report Two Boats Sunk.

LONDON, Oct. 2.—A dispatch to Lloyds from Corfu says that two Turkish torpedo boats were sunk and a third crippled off Gumentizza near Prevesa by the patrolling Italian fleet.

Appeal to England.

Calcutta, Oct. 2.—A cablegram was forwarded from here today in the name of the Mohammedans of India, urging Great Britain as the "greatest Mohammedan power in the world" to check Italy's career of aggression.

"Defend Honor of Islam."

Another message from the same source went forward to the grand vizier at Constantinople, urging that Turkey defend the honor of Islam.

Mohammedans Aroused.

That the Mohammedans of India are thoroughly aroused is indicated by organization in Calcutta of a strong committee styled "The Indian Red Crescent Society," which proposed to take such steps as seem advisable to prevent war.

Federal Court Convenes Today

Judge James E. Boyd Presides — Grand Jury Selected And Charged — Fifty-nine Cases on Docket—Other Federal Officers in Attendance.

The October term of federal court convened this morning at 11 o'clock in the court room of the post office, with his Honor, Judge James E. Boyd, presiding.

The business of the court this morning was the selection of the grand jury, and Judge Boyd's charge to it. Fifty-nine cases, concerned for the most part with illicit distilling and retailing, are on the docket for trial at this term, and court will sit until they are disposed of.

Little 1-year-old Williamson Bradford drew out the following names for the grand jury:

One member of the jury is a negro.

Judge Boyd's Charge.

Judge Boyd's charge to the jury was a scholarly address of fifty minutes duration. He told them that their purpose was two-fold. In the first place they should investigate all grounds of violation of the law that came before them. In the second place they should see to it that no innocent person should be subjected to the inconvenience of trial without due reason. He charged them that they had no common law jurisdiction. The federal laws result only incidentally in decency and good order. They pertain more particularly to the integrity of the government, the protection of its funds, the safe-guarding of the general public from the machinations of industrial combinations, and analogous services. The territorial limits which confine state courts would embarrass them in dealing with these matters.

Judge Boyd outlined the forces which had brought about a clear understanding of the division of state and federal powers. He traced the political division on the issue of centralization of power or state's rights from the very beginning of the government, and declared that the great civil war had settled that issue forever. It devolved upon the grand jury as citizens to inculcate that principle.

Judge Boyd took occasion to fire a hot shot at the critics of the supreme court for its decisions on the Sherman anti-trust law. "Not as a judge, but as a citizen," he declared, "I insist that the court could have made no other decision. It is only the unreasonable violation of law that is a violation of law. And I am one who believes that there should be judicial legislation by the supreme tribunal of the United States. When you attack that tribunal you sap the bulwarks of our government."

Where the federal government formerly received several million dollars in whisky tax from North Carolina, said Judge Boyd, the only revenue it has from that source now is the special stamp tax which some blind tigers pay in an effort to avoid a contest with Uncle Sam.

Mr. H. K. Richardson Sworn In. Mr. H. K. Richardson was sworn in to practice in the federal court. The oath was administered by Attorney W. S. O'B. Robinson.

One of the Interesting Cases.

A case which will attract unusual interest this week is that of Mr. J. A. Smith, of Bessemer City, who is charged with violation of the federal statute which makes it unlawful to solicit campaign funds from federal officeholders. Mr. Smith was a republican candidate for congress from this district in 1908 when the alleged violation of the law occurred. He is represented by Attorney J. F. Newell.
