

ARROGANT AUTUMN HAS COME WEATHER TALK

The Weather Man was appealed to yesterday to tell the thushness of the coolness, in poetic, as well as atmospheric terms he replied: Arrogant Autumn Appears. Autumn has come at last, and with a vengeance. In the words of the poet:

"The melancholy days are come, the saddest of the year, Of weeping winds, and wailing woods, and meadows brown and sear."

It is, however, quite unnecessary to state that autumn has come, for most people who had the inclination to venture out Sunday and yesterday, have been very much impressed with the above fact.

Following after Saturday, with the mercury at 91 degrees, which according to the figures obtained from the observer at the local office of the weather bureau, was the hottest day recorded in thirty-three years at so late a date in October, came the cool breezes from off a large area of frost producing weather to the northwestward, with a temperature yesterday morning of 51 degrees. The cooler weather was duly predicted and authorized to arrive, yet it caught people "napping," as it were, who having retired to rest on Saturday night with the thermometer at 80, awoke Sunday morning, with shudders, shivers and sore throats. The temperature dropped 40 degrees in fourteen hours, and maintained a low standard throughout the day, Sunday, the highest figure being 54 degrees.

The average temperature Saturday was 80 degrees; which was sixteen degrees above the normal; that of Sunday was 52 degrees which was 12 degrees below the normal, making a change from mean of 28 degrees, which is a change rarely exceeded.

Winter wraps were visible on the streets yesterday and today, and the odor of mothballs, cedar and smoking tobacco, perfumed the chilly atmosphere.

The forecast issued yesterday calls for rain tonight. No marked change in temperature is expected.

The 40-hour devotion, one of the most important services in the Catholic church, is to be held soon.

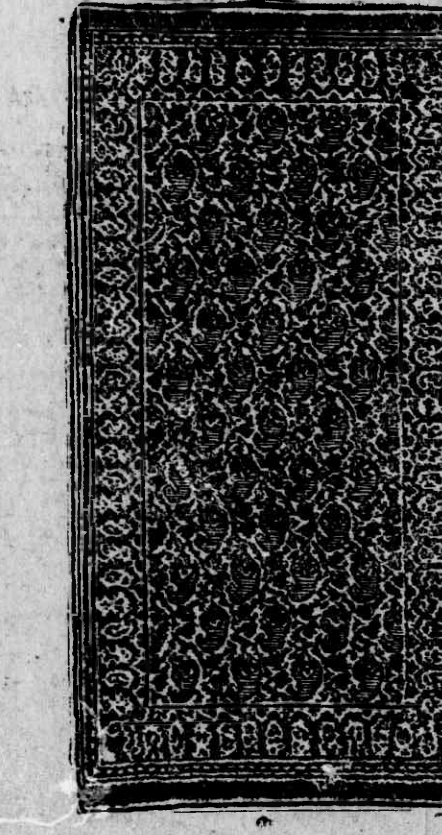

Railroads Complain of Low Mail Rates

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 10.—In view of the fact that by far the greater part of all mail matter transmitted in the United States is carried by mail for some part of its journey, and that these trips vary from a few miles to the entire span of the continent, it is surprising to learn that the total cost to the government of the services of the railways in carrying the mail from the point of its origin to the town or city of its destination is less than the cost of local delivery and collection.

In other words when you mail a letter from your Georgia post office to some friend in San Francisco, it costs the government less to take it across the continent, than it does to transport it from the Frisco post office two or three miles to your friend's front door. And recently the railroads of the nation, in Georgia and elsewhere, have made a systematic and serious complaint, filed through the proper channels, that the railroads are not being paid nearly as much as they should receive for this service which they perform for Uncle Sam.

It is the opinion of experts that the money paid the railroads now is so inadequate as to cause the roads a loss of millions every year on the handling of mail matter.
