

Late News From State Capital

Special to The News. Raleigh, N. C., Oct. 18.—The Home Savings Bank of Wilmington, was chartered today with \$100,000 capital authorized and \$50,000 subscribed by J. W. Little, J. H. James, C. VanLeaven and W. W. Love.

Editor in City. Editor T. A. Stovall, of the Savannah Press, is here for a day or two on his way to Richmond to attend the session of the Deeper Waterways Association here. He has a daughter in the state fair. Evidences of progress in Raleigh, he says, surpasses anything he has seen in this section of the country in a great while.

Corporation Commission. Before the corporation commission today there was a hearing that involves extensive tracts of land in Yadkin county owned by N. Glenn Williams, Walter Martin and the Rhodes Manufacturing Company. The petitioners claim that the local county tax assessors discriminated against their lands in fixing the assessments. The county board of equalization sustained the local assessors and now the appeal comes to the corporation commission as a state tax commission for final settlement.

Appeal Argued. One of the appeals argued today before the supreme court from the Eighth district was Clark vs. Casualty Co., from Waresboro, which involves a question of law that has been undecided in this state for a long while, that is the liability of employer's liability insurance company in connection with a suit for damages. In this case John S. Clark lost his life at Hewitt Falls power plant while in the employ of Bonsel Co., construction contractors, who were insured against damages by injury to employees in the Maryland Casualty Company, Baltimore. In suing for damages the Casualty Company was made co-defendant, with Bonsel Company and demurred, the appeal being from this, counsel for the plaintiff insisting that the Casualty Company having assumed to protect the Bonsel Company loss in such damages, employed the counsel to fight the suit they were equally liable. Lockhart & Dunlap and Robinson & Caudle represent the plaintiff and McLean & Felton and Vassar the defendant. In the incident that killed Clark these men fell into the great pond and one, Jno. T. Howell, was rescued, hours afterwards, after most harrowing experiences that caused his hair to turn white.

Captain Stafford Improved. Considerable improvement is reported in the condition of Capt. Gaston Stafford, superintendent of the State Fair Grounds, who was reported desperately ill yesterday with paralysis threatened. He is 70 years old and has had charge of the State Fair Grounds since 1873. He is the father of Talbot Stafford, the well known football player on the A. & M. team.

Officers Commissioned. As officers of Company M, Second Regiment, Duan, N. C., commissions are just issued from the office of the adjutant general of the North Carolina National Guard to J. L. Hines, as captain; A. M. Hollingsworth as first lieutenant; W. A. Jackson as second lieutenant.

Back From Convention. Just back from the annual convention of the National Guard Association at Buffalo, Adjutant General R. L. Lelander of the North Carolina Guard, is delighted that the association will hold its 1914 session in Norfolk and says that North Carolina guardsmen will flock there from every part of the state to take advantage of the inspiring sessions. The North Carolina delegation to Buffalo included: Adjutant General Lelander, Col. S. W. Minor, Durham; Major R. T. Daniel, Weldon; Capt. Paul Jones, Tarboro; Capt. O. Max Gardner, Shelby.

Only State Case This Week. The only state case argued this week in the supreme court in connection with the hearing of Eighth district appeals, was that today in State vs. Leak, from Richmond county in which the appeal is from a five-year sentence to the penitentiary for criminal assault upon a twelve-year-old daughter of a Rockingham citizen of good standing for whom the prisoner was working at the time the crime was committed. The prisoner denies any criminal intent and insists that he had no intention of criminal assault and the instance on appeal is that no criminality was proven in the trial below.

BOY SENT TO HIGHER COURT FOR MURDER OF SISTER. Asheville, N. C., Oct. 18.—Ernest Webb, a 15-year-old boy who is charged with feloniously killing his 13-year-old sister, Mary Webb, about two weeks ago at their home in Leicester town, near Newfound, was given a preliminary hearing before Magistrate W. R. Gudger yesterday. The hearing was originally set for one day last week but a continuance was granted the defense. The hearing was begun at 11 o'clock this morning and a recess taken shortly after noon. The court convened at 3 o'clock and the trial brought to a close. From the evidence introduced the court held that the boy was guilty at least of an assault with a deadly weapon and so would have to be bound to a higher court.

ATLANTIC CITY'S THIRST.

"Oh, How Dry We Are," Resounded On First "Closed" Sunday. Atlantic City, N. J., Correspondence New York Sun. Hip-pocket weapons were much in evidence and street speakies appeared now and then to shake the thirst of sufferers temporarily. Hollow cans loaded with wet goods were displayed along the Boardwalk and the little knots of visitors gathered together in corners of pavilions or behind sheltering doorways usually denoted that the walking-sticks were pretty "loose at the joints."

Just before midnight last night it was a common sight to see people carrying home boxes of beer and other supplies. These were residents who expected guests today and had not known of the closing order until finishing up the night at cafe bars, when it was too late to order from the dealers along the avenue. Not that Atlantic City has so many toppers, but hundreds who ordinarily would not have thought of drinking at the bars open suddenly acquired thirsts and wanted something to satisfy them just because it was not obtainable. Of course, soft stuff could easily be secured, but that wasn't the something for which they were looking.

Promptly at midnight last night the case suddenly ceased. Patrons who chanced to be in the cafes, and there were many, who wanted to see whether the closing was one of the usual jokes, were prevailed upon to leave with their curiosity satisfied. Music stopped and the lights were dimmed. It was the first time the town had actually gone "closed" since Governor Fort four years ago managed to close the resort for one Sunday. While the police denied they had been notified officially to carry out the order, policemen were much in evidence hovering about the cafes and saloon doors. On the other hand, the authorities said that they never knew officially that the town was open on Sundays.

MAY SAVE HERO'S LIFE.

Bitten by Mad Dog He Seized When Kiddies Were in Peril. Atlantic City, Oct. 18.—As a precautionary measure against the development of hydrophobia, John Boyd, who proved himself a hero several days ago at Ohio and Atlantic avenues, when he seized a mad dog and prevented it from running among a crowd of school children, has been sent to the Mercy Hospital, Pittsburg, to be kept under the closest observation.

Boyd was bitten by the dog, and his case was brought to the attention of Dr. John Buchanan, a Pittsburg specialist, who was staying at Garden Hall. Dr. Buchanan immediately became interested in the case, principally because of Boyd's heroism, and arranged to have him cared for at the hospital. The patient was reported today as being well on the road to recovery, and no serious results are expected.

RECEIVER FOR DEFUNCT ASHEVILLE COMPANY.

Special to The News. Asheville, N. C., Oct. 18.—J. E. Rankin was last week appointed as temporary receiver of the Asheville Hardware company and Judge H. P. Lane has now signed an order making the receivership permanent and Mr. Rankin is ordered by the court to wind up the affairs of the business. The indebtedness of the company was found by the court to aggregate \$31,000 and of this amount, \$22,500 is due the National, State and City Bank of Richmond.
