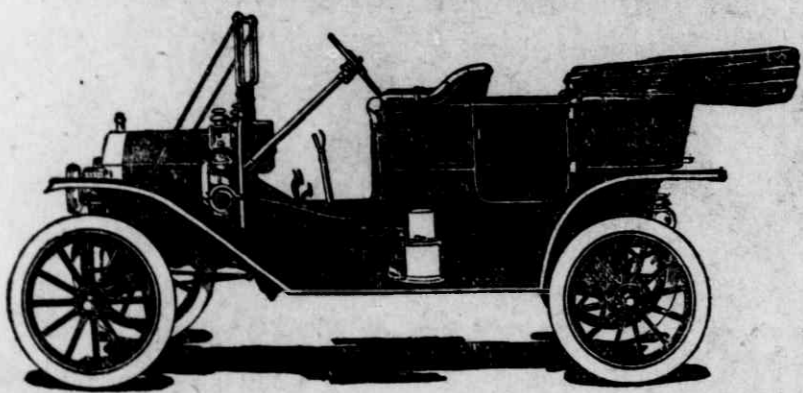

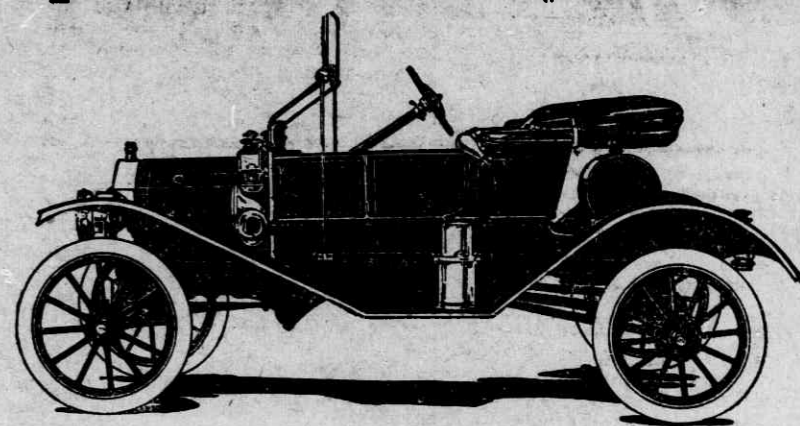

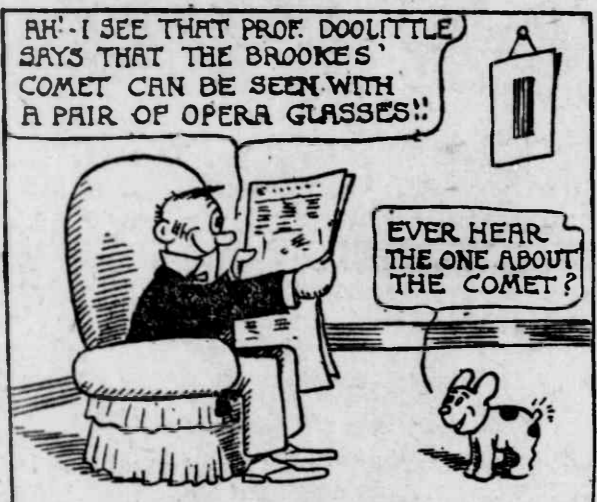

TRYING TO SECURE NAMES OF 50,000 CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS.
