Call For Ministerial Meeting

The following call issued by the executive committee of the Men and Religious Movement as appointed by the Ministerial Association to represent them is self explanatory.

The letter calls for a meeting that promises great things for the religious life of Charlotte.

Charlotte, N. C., Nov. 1, 1911.

Dear Sir: You have been chosen by your pastor to represent your church at the meeting announced below. You are already enlisted in the service of Christ. Are you satisfied with the state of religion among the men and boys of your congregation? If it is not what it ought to be are you willing to confer with other Christian men as to what can be done to improve the conditions? If it is all that can be desired, will you not come and help the rest of us to some line of effort by which we may attain a like satisfactory result in our work among men and boys?

Whatever the state of this work in your congregation, we most earnestly desire your presence with us in a great gathering of the Christian men of our city, Sunday afternoon at 5 o'clock at Young Men's Christian Association building at which time an address will be made by the eminent clergyman, the Rev. Dr. Howard Lee Jones, of Charleston, S. C., who will tell us about the Men and Religion Forward Movement, its purpose, its plans, its program.

This is not a new organization, but a concerted and co-operative movement throughout the North American continent to concentrate the efforts of the men of all the churches upon a few specific lines of work that seem to be vital to the attaining of more satisfactory results among men and boys.

Each congregation is to be encouraged and assisted in the doing of this work through the agencies already existing within its own bounds. The movement is assuming vast proportions and promises large results in the enlightenment of Christ over the hearts of men. Whether the effort be made in Charlotte or in your particular congregation or not, you will wish to know about the movement anyway that you may be intelligent regarding the efforts of other men for the salvation of their fellow man.

Please let nothing of small moment keep you away. The date is November 8th, the time is 5 o'clock, and the place is the Young Men's Christian Association.

Winds Kept Down Frost in South Atlantic States

Atlanta, Ga., Nov. 3.—Frosts predicted for the South Atlantic and Gulf States for last night were prevented in most sections by high winds, according to reports received here from many points this morning. While the weather was the coldest of the season it is not believed that the crops suffered any material damage. Charlotte, N. C., reported a mild frost with but little consequent damage to vegetation. The lowest temperatures recorded ranged from 29 degrees above zero at Charlotte to 52 above at Jacksonville, Fla. A range of from 36 to 40 above was recorded in Mississippi, Alabama and Louisiana.

SERIES OF POISONING CASES.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 3.—Whether Chicago has had a series of poisoning cases comparing with the Guinness murders of Indiana or whether a number of recent deaths of associates of Mrs. Louise Vermilya constitute a series of remarkable coincidences, is expected to be indicated today when Prof. Walter Haynes makes known the condition of the viscera of Arthur Rissotte, a policeman, who died suddenly a week ago in a hospital after being removed from rs. Vermilya's house.

Professor Haynes completed the examination yesterday but refused to make known the result to anyone but Coroner Hoffman, who said he might cause the bodies of at least two of the eight other associates of Mrs. Vermilya, who died suddenly, to be exhumed for examination.

BOTH PARTIES INTERESTED IN DEMOCRATIC MEETING.

Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 3.—Tomorrow promises to be one of interest to both parties in Tennessee. The independent democratic state committee will meet here at noon and from the secrecy attending the preliminaries, developments are expected. At the last meeting a sub-committee was authorized to prepare a plan for a general primary, in which votes will be cast on various matters from presidential preference to new committee-men. It is not known whether the sub-committee is ready to report or, and whether further efforts at harmonizing the party will be attempted.

GERMANY RECOGNIZES FRENCH PROTECTORATE IN MOROCCO.

Paris, Nov. 3.—The contents of the Franco-German accord officially given out today, show that Germany recognizes the right of France to establish a protectorate in Morocco, while both nations engage to obtain the adhesion to this accord of other signatories to the Algerias agreement.
