The teachers of this school are Prof. G. P. Heilig and Mr. Lewis M. Hunter. Fifty-two are now enrolled in this department and others are contemplating entering.

The enrollment in the association

night school at the Y. M. C. A. building has now passed the 80 mark, and this makes the largest enrollment that the Charlotte Y. M. C. A. has ever had.

The Y. M. C. A. and the Y. M. C. A. will jointly promote a night school at North Charlotte for the winter months. This night school will open Tuesday night and will meet every Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights at 7 o'clock to 8:30. The teachers will be Miss Lona Squires, who is one of the successful teachers of the city schools

and Mr. Jesse Loder, a teacher at the Piedmont Industrial School, operated by Rev. J. A. Baldwin.

There will be no fees charged because of the fact that the board of education and Mr. C. W. Johnson have agreed to underwrite the expense of operating. All North Charlotte young men and women, boys and girls, desiring instruction at night are welcome. This school will be managed as a branch of the associations' night schools.

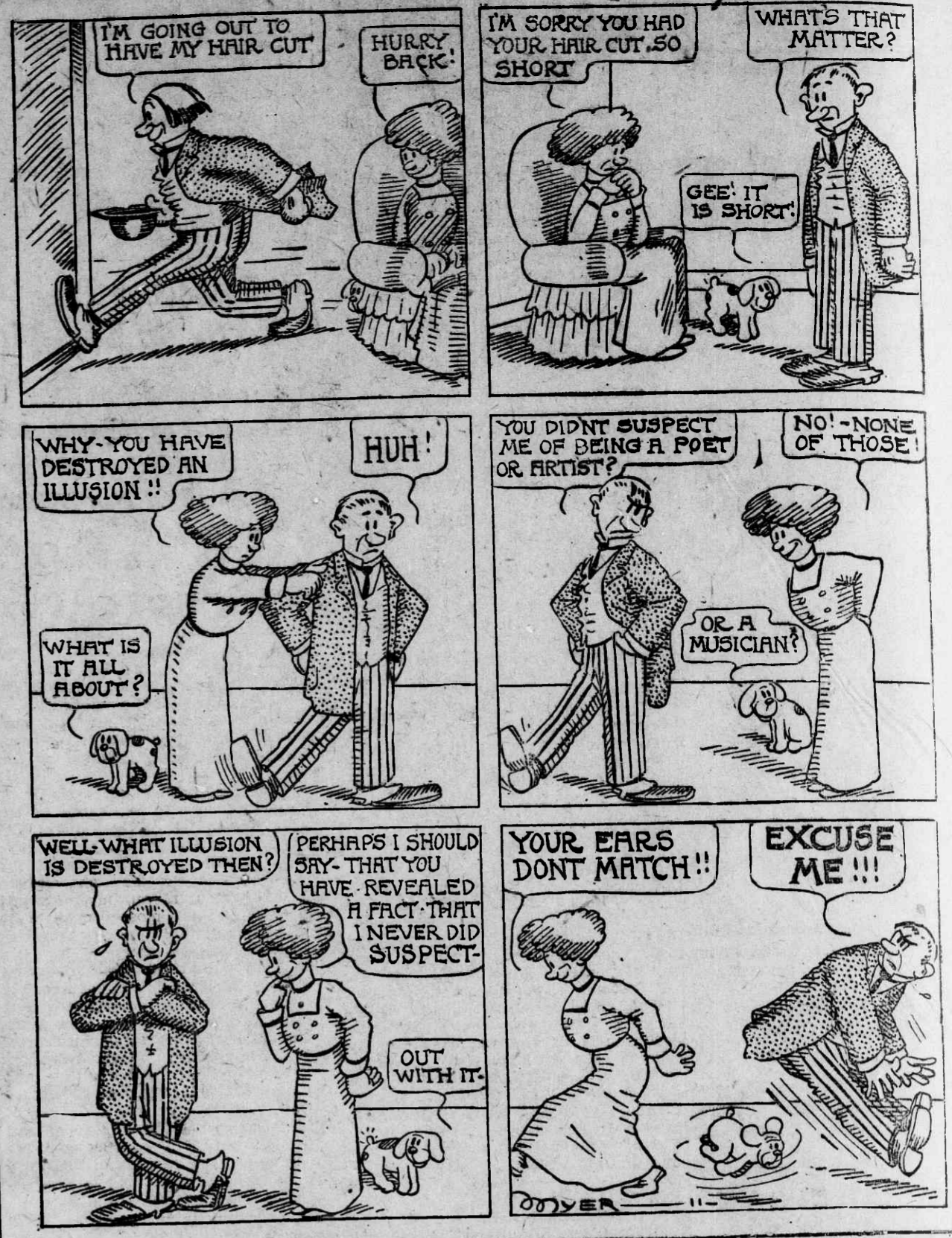

NOMINATE WILSON, URGES JOHN SHARP WILLIAMS.

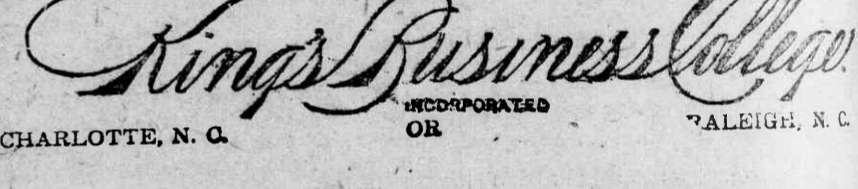
Senator Says He Has Seized on the Fundamental Idea, Prevent Privileges by Law.

Charlottesville, Va., Nov. 15.—In a letter to Dr. Hiden Ramsey, of Asheville, N. C., president of the Woodrow Wilson Club of the University of Virginia, Senator John Sharp Williams, of Mississippi, writes in part:

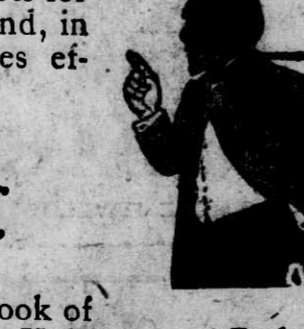
