





This exhibit was opened today and displays the dangers of the common house fly to the health of the community. It displays the germ carrying abilities and the repulsive appearance of the fly when seen under a microscop

This exhibit is the first material step in the awakening of citizens of Charlotte to the dangers of this animal or insect which lives only in the presence of unsanitary conditions. The fight has been undertaken by the health department of the Woman's Club as the most important step that is to be taken in the fight for the health of
