

Fine Openings for Baseball Players

New York, Dec. 29.—There should be some fine openings for young baseball players in the big league teams this year, for it now appears that most of the managers will have to depend on recruits to improve their positions in the pennant race. No big deals have been made and there are none in sight.
With the present line-ups of the big leagues it looks as though there would be no change in the finish of the pennant races next season unless through the help of new comers.
Most of the big team scouts are sanguine over prospects and declare that the opportunity for getting good new players is improving right along. A year ago the opposite was generally understood—the country had been combed for star players.

FURNITURE MAKERS ASK COMMISSION HELP IN FIGHT.

Raleigh, Dec. 29.—The traffic committee of the Southern Furniture Manufacturers' Association appeared before the North Carolina corporation commission yesterday afternoon in the interest of a suit begun by the manufacturers before the interstate commerce commission having for its object the elimination of discriminatory freight rates from points in this state to the West. The committee claimed that the difference between 100 pounds of furniture shipped from North Carolina or a Northern point is exactly 20 cents and that the advantage is with the Northern manufacturers.
The corporation commission was asked to become a party to the suit before the interstate commerce commission and to lend its good offices toward an adjustment that would be equitable to all concerned. Since the request has just been received, the commission did not promise anything, but it is quite likely that it will join with the furniture makers in the prosecution of the suit. A number of railroads are named.
The committee was composed of Fred N. Tate, chairman, High Point; B. F. Huntley, Winston-Salem; W. A. Thomas, Statesville; and C. J. Fields, High Point, secretary to the association.

WOMEN WIN HONORS IN CORN HUSKING.

Albert Lea, Minn., Dec. 29.—Three young women who reside near Lancaster, Minn., claim the woman championship corn husking honors of the United States. The young women are the Misses Lizzie, Mamie and Roxie Kehoe, who, in a recent contest, husked in five and one-half days 1,790 bushels, hauling each load of corn one-half mile. The average for each day for each girl was a little more than 108 bushels.

Boxing License Gives N. Y. \$300,000

Albany, N. Y., Dec. 29.—With the close of the present week the state athletic commission will finish its business for the year 1911 and submit its report to the legislature. The report will do much to show the real condition of the boxing game in the East, at the same time bringing out how the commission scheme of regulation has benefited the state treasury.

The report will show that fully \$150,000 has been turned into the state treasury during the first four months of the new law. If this average is maintained the yearly income will be \$450,000 even after paying the expenses of the commission.

The returns show that \$300,000 have been taken in by licensed boxing clubs in New York state since the law went into effect.

GREENSBORO STREET CAR EXTENSION COMPLETED.

Greensboro, Dec. 29.—The extension of the North Carolina Public Service Commission Line to Pomona is complete and the first cars were sent over the lines for passenger travel yesterday. The line extends from the passenger station to Lindley park and thence on over the extension to Pomona. This extension to Pomona considerably enlarges the company's system in Greensboro and gives the people residing in that thriving suburb four miles to and from Greensboro. The Public Service Company will operate a 30-minute schedule over this line daily and will charge a fare of ten cents from Greensboro to the terminus at Pomona.
