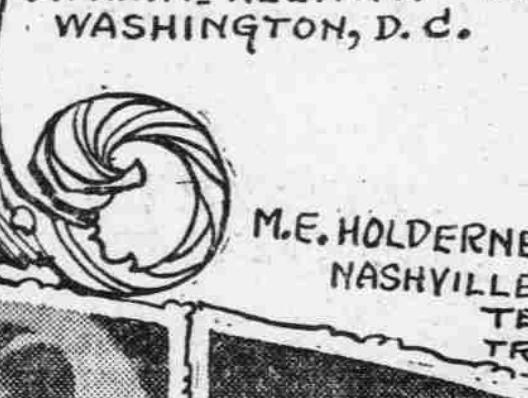

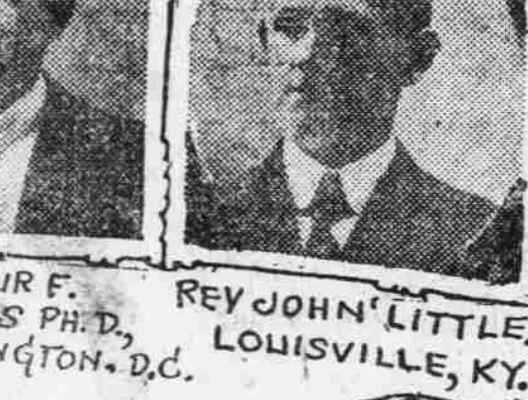

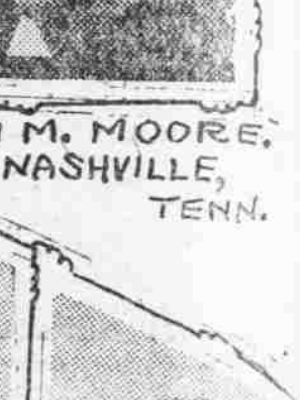

Some of the Notables.

Gov. Joseph M. Brown, of Georgia, who will deliver the address of welcome on Friday evening, April 25.

Chancellor J. H. Kirkland, Ph.D., Vanderbilt University, is recognized as the foremost educator of the south. His interest, however, is not confined to his profession. He is a leader in the Conference for Education in the South and was last year president of the Religious Education Association of America.

Dr. W. H. Hooper, of Tennessee, has within five years come from comparative obscurity to a position of national-wide influence, not only because of his political success, but because of his leadership in social betterment. No southern governor ever rendered a more timely or important service to his country than was performed by Governor Hooper in inaugurating the Southern Sociological Congress.

Dr. S. C. Mitchell, Ph.D., LL.D., chancellor of the University of South Carolina, is one of America's educational leaders who is helping to transform the educational system of the south into a more efficient agent in developing our national life.

Dr. Walter Rauschenbusch, of Rochester, N. Y., is the most powerful influence in America for social reforms. His books have caused more men to believe in the modern social movement than any other agency. He speaks with apostolic authority. His address at the federal council in Chicago was pronounced by many who heard it as the most eloquent speech they had ever heard. He is regarded in Germany as America's leading sociologist.

Clifford G. Roe, a brilliant young lawyer of Chicago, who has become so profoundly moved by the appalling revelations of the white slave traffic in American cities that he has given up his successful law practice to devote all his life to fighting the social evil.
