

# Bullies Watch Out; Judo Is Coming Here

The newest organization on campus is the "Judo and Kung-Fu Society." The society is open to all interested students, male and female, as well as all faculty members, according to Tim Britton, one of the founders of the club.

The organization's purpose, as stated in the new constitution which was approved during the last Student Legislature meeting, is "to demonstrate the philosophy of the oriental martial arts, and the merits of physical and mental fitness."

The membership dues will be \$2 per semester initially, but "after the necessary equipment is paid for, dues will be reduced" says Britton.

The society's meetings will take place every Wednesday afternoon during the regular academic year. Equal time will be given to both Kung-Fu (which is very similar to Karate), and Judo. There will also be a special self-defense course for female members which will stress the effortless means to thwart even the most vicious attacker.

Instruction in Judo will be by Britton, who holds a third-degree brown belt with the Japanese Black Belt Federation. Alfredo Sui, who holds the second-degree black belt, will instruct in Kung-Fu. Both Sui and Britton will demonstrate their arts as pertaining to self defense for the female members.

The first meeting of the society will be held today at 3:00 p.m. in room 209 of the University Union. All interested students and faculty members are urged to attend since this will be an organizational meeting. Following the planning session portion of the meeting, a demonstration will be

given by the two instructors. Britton suggests that students not "be caught off guard. Know how to protect yourself," he advises.

in the college. The only significant means of division we have is class. Therefore, legislative membership is based on class lines. After all, every student is a member of one of the four classes. In addition, students attending night classes are also represented.

However, it is easy to see that the Student Legislature is not fairly apportioned number-wise. There are many more freshmen than there are seniors; yet the Senior Class has just as many representatives as the Freshmen Class. There did not used to be such a big difference in numbers.

For reasons too obvious to mention, the last two Freshmen classes and especially the present one have been exceptionally large. Doubtlessly this trend will continue, but at least until the present Freshman Class, and to only a slightly lesser degree the Sophomore Class, become seniors, the bad apportionment will continue also.

Perhaps a solution, if one is necessary, would be to have a set number of legislators with each class having a proportionate number of representatives based on the size of the class. Or, perhaps, we could wait until we have student housing facilities or schools within the college and draw our apportionment along those lines. Or perhaps the classes will even up sufficiently in number in two or three years to justify the present system.
