The game was close from start to finish. The Forty - Niners, who trailed throughout the first half, were able to tie the score several times, but could never gain margin. The half ended with Charlotte down 40-43.

The second half was much the same. The Forty - Niners were able to tie the score, but never went ahead until the final three minutes.

Then, with 3:12 remaining, Lemmond hit, and put Charlotte ahead

by one. The lead then changed hands five times.

Finally, in the last 50 seconds. Lemmond hit on a field goal, and was fouled. He connected on the free throw, to give the Forty-Niners their largest lead, three points, at 79-76. Armstrong scored twice more, to take a shakey one point lead.

With 19 seconds left, Lemmond was fouled again. His shot rolled around the rim until it was tapped in by Ben Basinger, for two points.

The final 15 seconds of the game saw both teams with scoring opportunities. Armstrong's last serious threat came with nine seconds foul shots, both of which were missed. Charlotte grabbed the rebound, and held on for the final horn.

The Forty - Niner drive was led by the clutch shooting of Bobby Lemmond, who had 30 points for the game, and Jerry Anthony who added 16. Snipes and Redmond hit for 11 points each. Armstrong was led by John Tatum who had 22. Three other Armstrong men also hit in double figures.

The key to Charlotte's win was in the inspired rebounding and defense of Lemmond, Anthony, and Basinger. Jerry Overcash, al-though he scored little, was one of the prime men in the offence, and was able to keep the ball moving well.

The game was an overall team effort.

Although hurt badly by a large number of turnovers, Charlotte compensated by fighting savagely under the boards each time they began to fall behind. The win gave UNC-C a 7 and
