Air Force Orchestra To Appear In Charlotte

Audiences from Texas to Virginia will have the opportunity to hear one of the nation's leading jazz organizations as the Airmen of Note, the official dance orchestra of the U. S. Air Force, 'hits the road' for their Fall Tour through seven Southwestern and Southern states.

Students here can see the band perform at Myers Park High School at a split matinee and at Owens Auditorium in the evening on Wednesday, November 22. The performances will be presented free of charge as a public service by the United States Air Force.

The itinerary includes 26 concerts in 21 days to an estimated audience of 40,000, while many thousands more will view the band on their two scheduled television shows.

All appearances will be under the direction of the leader of the Airmen of Note, Chief Warrant Officer Bob Bunton.

On the 10th of November the tour will begin in San Antonio and then continue through Texas, Louisiana,

Arkansas, Tennessee, Georgia, North Carolina, and Virginia. All concerts will be presented free of charge as a public service by the United States Air Force.

Newspaper critics have praised this outstanding musical organization all along their concert route. Mr. Leonard Metz, music critic of the San Bernardino Sun-Telegram, said, "It was a spirited concert by a band full of talent.

It was the first visit of the band to San Bernardino. Judging from the response of the audience, it will probably not be the last." And in Fresno, the "Fresno Bee" said, "Its forte is ensemble playing, meticulous, crisp work from all sections, and it is a hard blowing group." The Airmen of Note, continued the article, "... had the folks in Convention Center Theater tapping their feet in pure delight."
