student body. Mr. Billups was quoted as saying, right of the Publications Board to place these restrictions on student publications."

As of this writing there are approximately 600 signatures on the petition. The goal of the petitioners is 1,000 signatures.

Rick Dancy, former editor of

the Carolina Journal, had this to say about the recent decision handed down by the Publications Board, "I think it is the most stupid—thing I have ever heard of. I also feel that the institution has long since passed the point where any one male or female can effectively run it. It must be a cooperative and wellcoordinated venture if we are ever going to truly make the transition from small junior col-

lege to a full-fledged university. I think that one of the best ways to determine when a college begins its maturation process to true university status is by judging the quality of its is by judging the quality of its student publication. By publication I mean publications conceived by the students and intended to be read by the students and by the degree of responsibility accorded to the students who publish it."

"The type of administrative censorship we are now faced with can spell the doom of quality student publications," Mr. Dancy continues.

The petition is expected to be presented at tomorrow's meeting of the Publications Board, If no satisfactory decision is agreed upon by the Board, the final result rests in the hands of Chancellor D. W. Colvard.
