Outstanding City Heart Surgeon Speaks On Heart Transplants Today

A noted heart surgeon will speak on the implications of the recent impressive heart transplants which have been so much in the news. He will also show color films of his research in open heart surgery.

Dr. Francis Robicsek, a Hungarian and a graduate of the University Medical School of Budapest, took an internship at that school and had his residency in Budapest and at Charlotte Memorial Hospital, where he is now on the staff. He will speak at 11:30 a.m. in the Parquet Room today.

Since 1960 Dr. Robicsek has had a full time practice in thoracic and cardiovascular surgery. He does work at Mercy, Presbyterian and Charlotte Rehabilitation Hospitals as well as at Memorial.

He was an associate professor at the University Medical School of Budapest before coming to the states. Dr. Robicsek is a member of numerous medical societies.

Dr. Philip Hildreth, of the Biology Department, will introduce Dr. Robicsek. A question and answer period will follow the lecture. The presentation is made possible through the United Re-

ligion Ministry and with the cooperation of the Biology Department.

Mrs. Leah Porat, Program Manager for the Israel Broadcasting Corporation, will be on campus today. Mrs. Porat will speak on the topic, "Mass Media and Politics in the Turbulent Middle East." The speech is open to the public. It will be given in room 210 of the University Union at 12:00 noon.

Leah Porat was born in Rumania and settled in Israel in 1935. She completed her elementary and secondary education in Jerusalem and later graduated from Hebrew University of Jerusalem, majoring in History, Classical Languages and French Culture.

While still a student she did radio work, specializing in radio drama and youth programs. In 1943 she was appointed to an executive position with the broadcasting service and became Deputy Program Manager of the Israel

Broadcasting Corporation in 1951. She has held her present position since 1961.
