N. Carolina Laws Now

The text of laws which govern some 5,000,000 residents of the Tar Heel state have recently become available in the Atkins Library. These laws appear in the General Statutes of North Caro-line a two we when some recently line, a twelve volume set recently acquired by the Library.

Ten of the volumes contain the general laws (with annotations) as enacted through the 1963 session of the General Assembly. The remaining two volumes contain laws enacted during the 1965 session. Legislation enacted in the 1967 session appears in the 1967 Session Laws.

The twelve volumes, including a two-volume index, are arranged chronologically by chapter. Each chapter contains laws relating to a particular subject field such as

insurance, roads and highways, elections, and higher education. Altogether the General Statutes contain 167 chapters. An appendix to the General Statutes contains the North Carolina Constitution, when of provide in the state
