Atkins Library Obtains Machine To Make Permanent Copy

A Filmac 400 M reader-printer designed for making a permanent copy from microfilm is the latest addition to the list of equipment acquired by the Atkins Library.

The semi-automatic reader-printer, manufactured by the Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Company, is designed for printing from either 16mm or 35mm roll microfilm or microfilm in aperture cards. The reader-printer is equipped with an accessory adapter which can be used for printing from microfiche up to 5 x 8" in size. It provides a rapid, simple method of viewing microfilm and/or microfiche and making a negative copy. "Library Technology Reports (July, 1967)

describes the Filmac Model 400 as "a well designed and well constructed machine with a number of useful features."

Acting Librarian Joseph F. Boykin, Jr. invites all UNC-C students and faculty members to use the machine as the need arises. Ac-

ording to Mr. Boykin, the machine will be used for printing only, and users will be assessed a charge of ten cents per print. Located in the Audio-Visual room on the second floor of the Atkins Library, the reader-printer will be operated by library staff members upon request of a student or faculty member who desires to have a copy made from microfilm or microfiche.

Microfilm holdings of the Atkins Library include the New York Times, Wall Street Journal, Christian Science Monitor, two Charlotte newspapers and several periodicals. Microfiche holdings include the North American Review.

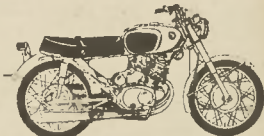
