

Political Science Profs All To Travel

The Political Science Department, including all its four members, will be on the go this summer from Washington to Southeast Asia. Saul Brenner, a veteran of three years at this campus, will spend

part of the summer in Washington. He will be on a survey concerning the role of newspaper response to Supreme Court decisions on attitudes of Congressmen. The information compiled from this survey will be

used by Mr. Brenner in his doctoral dissertation entitled, "Civil Liberties, Newspaper Response, and Congressional Reaction." This campus has awarded a grant from the Institutional Grant for Science to William Biglow, who

will also travel to Washington. He will do research on American foreign policy. His study is entitled "Bay of Pigs and Cuban Missiles: Policy Evaluation and Organizational Learning." In Washington, Mr. Biglow will use

the national archives and other official documents, and possibly interview people who have vital information. He plans to write an article on the basis of this results which he hopes to publish.

Mr. Biglow's doctoral thesis is still in progress. He has entitled it, "Alliance For Progress, the OAS, and the Kennedy Administration." He hopes to finish the dissertation this summer.

Dr. Nish Jangotch has received a University of North Carolina Foundation Research Grant and has been appointed a guest scholar at Brookings Institute. Brookings is a research organization in Washington which specializes in research in foreign and domestic policy. His project this summer is to analyze the impact of the war in Vietnam on the unity in the international socialist system.

Some of the areas he plans to investigate are the precise role of the dispute concerning overland routes of supplies through China from the Soviet Union and the dispute over quantities and types of supplies to North Vietnam. Dr. Jangotch looks forward to publishing the findings of this research.

Dr. Frances Starner, who has made three previous trips to Southeast Asia in work on a book she is now writing, will travel to California and then to Manila, Singapore, and South Vietnam this summer. Her book, entitled "Asian Solutions to Asian Problems: The Search For Regional Cooperation in Southeast Asia," will be published some time next year.

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
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
