representative on the Student Activities. The position was previously filled by Dwayne Spitzer until he accepted the duties of Vice-Chairman of the University Union.

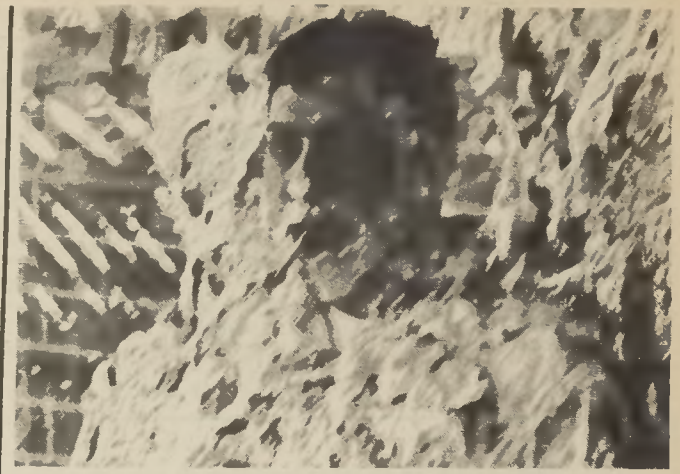

Intercollegiate Council Forms In Charlotte

An Intercollegiate Council is currently being formed among several of the local colleges. The Council will consist of the Presidents of the various student bodies or their representatives. The schools involved are UNC-C, Mercy School of Nursing, Belmont Abbey, Queens College, and Johnson C. Smith. These are the schools which have banded together to establish the council and start planning the activities to be undertaken. Other colleges will be asked to join the council. These prospective new members will be: Wingate, Winthrop, and Central Piedmont Community College.

Tentative objectives of the Intercollegiate Council are to bring the campuses closer together culturally. The council hopes to

make the activities on each campus better known to all the other campuses so that all of the students from each of the colleges will be able to pick and choose among activities to attend. The council is also planning to have, for the students of each campus, a type of student card which will allow the students to buy at discount prices from many of the merchants in town. Hopefully, in time, when the student discount card goes into full effect, there will be reduction for students at the theaters, Coliseum, cleaners, and restaurants.

The progress of the council will be carried in the JOURNAL, and the students here will be informed when the Student Discount Cards become available. As soon as the information on the activities of other campuses begins to come in, the students here will be told.

The contest "Back the 49'ers Campaign" is a contest among the various clubs and organizations on the UNC-C campus. It is a contest, organized by Alpha Phi Omega, to see which club on campus shows the most support for the basketball team and shows the most school spirit. Each club organizes and conducts their own spirit campaign. These campaigns are regulated only in that the campaigns must conform to publicity rules, dress rules and any other rules set up by the Student Legislature, administration and the UNC-C Board of Directors. The most noteworthy of the regulations are the Publicity rules and that the campaigns must not interfere with the normal functions of the University. Also, no posters may be put up before 6:00 p.m. Friday, November 22, 1968. All sign and posters must be removed by Wednesday, December 11, 1968. All signs and posters are to be removed by the club which placed them.

Some ideas for the campaign are the placing of posters and billboards on and off campus, attending the games as a group,

going to the games in car caravans, wearing clothes and carrying signs that express the backing of the basketball team.

The judges of the contest will be the basketball team. They will announce the winning club at the St. Andrews game on December 9,

1968.

After the start of the contest A P O will participate like all the other clubs. We do, however, ask and challenge each club to take part in this contest in which there will be no real losers.
