Civil Defence Exercise to be Scheduled for Trainees

The University and the Civil Defense Office in Charlotte will be sponsoring a 25-man 20 hour exercise in shelter living. The project along with eight hours of class instruction is intended to train people in the heart of living 14 days in a fallout shelter after a nuclear attack.

In a recent letter to Dean MacKay from Kenneth D. Williams, Director of the Civil Defense Office, Mr. Williams

stated that the University had recently been equipped with a 14-day supply of food, medical supplies, and sanitation equipment. They have also supplied radiological equipment adequate to determine at all times the protection factor within the several buildings on campus.

In an effort to train people in "Shelter Management" there will be eight hours of classroom instruction here on campus. Then

the group will spend 20 hours in a fallout shelter. The Civil Defense Agency has offered its "very realistic" fallout shelter in the basement of the Red Cross Building at 2425 Park Road at the place for 20-hour stay.

The program will be conducted for groups of 25 or more students, faculty, and administrators. Those interested in obtaining this valuable life-saving information may sign up at the desk in the student union.

statements to be true, they merely ALMOST prove it. The reader of THE MORNING OF THE MAGICIANS puts the book down and glances over his shoulder.

The concept of another realm of reality as presented in this Avon book is usually optimistic. Only once in history has the knowledge of the occult been truly detrimental to civilization. Inspired by the superman concept of Nietzsche; Gurdjieff, Horbiger, and Hielscher, guided by the mystic Hauschofer, founded the Black Order. Under the influence of Eastern mysticism and endorsed by the theory of Glacia'

Cosmogony, the Thule Society (under the guise of the Nazi Party) placed their messiah, Adolf Hitler, at the helm of the most militaristic society in history. With the secret Anherbe in the background, Hitler became the high priest of one of the most frightening religions ever—the Death's Head S.S., whose warrior-monks brought ruin to most of Europe. But there is much more to this story and the others in THE MORNING OF THE MAGICIANS. Only the talented pen of Pauwels can explain the phenomena of Hitler and the Will of the Knights of the Powers of Darkness and the many other examples of fantastic realism found in the book.

(Continued from page 1) and buy books for the library. The additional books would help to bring the library up to a level with the libraries of other new universities. The increase in teachers salaries is hoped to attract scholars to this new university.

About \$4 million would be used for new buildings on campus. Plans are being made for an Earth-Life Science building to handle the crowding conditions that exist in that curriculum. Part of the money would be used to

build a medical health facilities for the resident students who will be living in the new dorms. There is also a plan for creation of outdoor physical education facilities. Engineering equipment and roads and walkways are also part of the requested budget.

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
