

Office of Academic Affairs Alters Policy

Beginning immediately, the following twelve responsibilities, traditionally handled by the Office of Academic Affairs, will be handled instead by the Divisional Chairmen, or by the Divisional Chairmen and the Office of Academic Affairs as indicated. Divisional and Departmental Chairmen are requested to be sure that all faculty members in their respective divisions and departments know of this change in administrative channels.

(1) WAIVERS OF UNIVERSITY REGULATIONS.--Waivers concerning graduation requirements and entrance deficiencies will be the responsibility of divisional chairmen. Waivers concerning prerequisites for courses will be handled, as they have been in the past, by the departmental chairmen.

(2) AUTHORIZATION FOR WORK ON ANOTHER CAMPUS.--Authorization for work on another campus as a part of the degree requirements on this campus will now go from the major department and, if necessary, the related-work departments, to the divisional chairmen rather than to the Office of Academic Affairs. This responsibility will also include letters certifying good standing and permission to do summer work at any institution.

(3) AUTHORIZATION FOR CORRESPONDENCE WORK.--Authorization for correspondence work will now be the responsibility of the divisional chairmen.

(4) AUTHORIZATION FOR GRADUATION IN ABSENTIA.--Authorization for graduation IN ABSENTIA will be granted by the divisional chairmen.

(5) PERMISSION TO VISIT CLASSES.--Permission to visit classes and permission to change an audit to a credit registration will hence forth be handled by the divisional chairmen.

(6) PASS-FAIL OPTION.--The determination of questions about the pass-fail option will be made by the divisional chairmen.

(7) CHANGES IN EXAMINATION SCHEDULES.--Permission for early, late, or special examinations will now be handled within each division with the chairman making the decision.

(8) SCHEDULING.--The collection and coordination of the schedules of the departments within a division will now be the responsibility of each divisional chairman. The Office of Academic Affairs will attempt to be of assistance in coordinating across divisional lines, but it will be most useful if the divisional schedules can come in with the problems of coordination identified.

(9) INTERPRETATION OF POLICIES AND REGULATIONS.--The interpretation of faculty and administrative policies to students and faculty, and information on University regulations and customs are responsibilities of the divisional chairmen.

Arthur Ford to Talk Monday

Arthur Ford, America's foremost medium will speak at UNC-C on Monday, March 17, 1969. Mr. Ford is an ordained minister of the Disciples of Christ Church. He is also a founder of the Spiritual Foundation Fellowship. He will be coming to Charlotte this week to organize a chapter of SFF. His appearance at UNC-C is being sponsored by the United Religious Ministry and the Baptist Student Union.

Readers of LOOK magazine will recall that Mr. Ford is given considerable attention in the reprint from Bishop James Pike's book, THE OTHER SIDE. In the article Mr. Ford is described as one of those mediums who uses a "control" figure in his mediumship.

The Reverend Mr. Ford is a psychic researcher and author. His most recent book, UNKNOWN BUT KNOWN, gives his philosophy about mediumship illustrating it with case histories from his own experience. No title has been given for his talk, but Eric Underwood, president of BSU, said that Mr. Ford would speak on psychic research. He will speak at 11:30 A.M. in C-220.

She is a junior.

Miss Carolyn Bobbitt and Mr. Steve Rayborn are the nominees for Vice-Chairman. Steve is Sophomore Class President and a member of the Union Arts Committee. Carolyn is co-chairman of the Union Arts Committee and a present member of the Program Board.

Miss Betty Kepley, the other co-chairman of the Arts Committee, is a junior from Kannapolis. She has filed for

Treasurer. Dan Wilson also filed for the office, but is academically ineligible to participate. Miss Barbara Mayer, a transfer from Limestone, was the only candidate to file for the office of Union Secretary during nominations in the Union Lobby last week.

Elections will take place today, tomorrow, and Friday at polls to be set up by Election Committee Chairman Jerrold Burks. Student Activity cards will be required in order for a student to vote. Campaign speeches will be held today in the cafeteria.

Write-in votes will be valid if the write-in candidates are eligible for office. Eligibility entails a 2.0 quality point average and previous service on a standing Union Committee.
