

# Drama Department Presents Three Plays

The Fine Arts Department of the University of North Carolina at Charlotte will present an experimental theatre workshop tomorrow night, Friday night, and Saturday night. Three plays will be presented in the program, which is entitled "Three on Stage."

"The Stronger," by Swedish naturalist August Strindberg, is an attempt to dramatize in the realistic mode the workings of the

mind. It is a one-acter set in a small ladies' cafe in Stockholm. The characters, played by Jayne Connell of Charlotte and Carol Phillips of Concord, are two rival women, one of whom is married to the man around whom their rivalry focuses. Only one of the characters speaks, and the actresses will alternate playing that role. The play will be directed by Dr. Catherine Nicholson of the UNC-C Drama

Department.

The second play on the bill, "The Meet," was written by UNC-C junior sociology major, Thomas Jefferson ("T.J.") Reddy. Bill Sloan, a UNC-C senior, and Arthur Lynch, an X-ray technician at Mercy Hospital, play a white and a black who have a confrontation at a fence. Reddy, who has published poetry in THE

RED CLAY READER, has expressed concern at the lack of publicity that his work has received on campus; he feels that the play is one of the best things that he has ever written. An active black militant and contributor to "3", Reddy received the Legettte Blythe Award for creative writing last Wednesday.

A medieval concept in mime, "All That Rolls Is Not Glitter," is the last play on the bill. Written by University of Iowa graduate student Alice Marriott, the wordless play is directed by David

Zimmerman and features Dan Cook, Richard Abernathy, and Cynthia Teat of Charlotte and Carol Staples of Laurinburg.

Laura Jacobs, Lanier Jones, Bill Sloan, Don Shuman, and Lloyd Miller compose the crew in this last program in this year's series of dramas at UNC-C. Plays previously presented include "Maze," "Under Milkwood," and "Crawling Arnold."

The program will begin at 8:15 p.m. on May 8, 9, and 10 in C-220 of the Liberal Arts Complex. Admission is free.
