When a person is browsing around the Dark Continent looking for something big to shoot, he is usually advised to take along the largest piece of artillery he can find. However, when a person does plan on going after such big game as elephant or rhino, he immediately thinks of his weapon as being a large caliber British rifle. Until the present time, England has succeeded in monopolizing the big game rifle market (450 caliber and above). Here in America, there has been little development in the production of either a rifle or a cartridge to equal the British guns for use, in Africa or the North American Continent, on large and *dangerous* game. This barrier was finally broken last June when Winchester announced its new .458 Magnum. It is the first American rifle and cartridge to be put into mass production that is of

.45 caliber and produces more than 5,000 foot pounds muzzle energy. One that has sufficient energy to produce one shot kills on any living animal.

The rifle is basically a Model 70 Winchester in Super Grade that has been modified in the stock and action so as to absorb the added recoil and pressures that are created by large caliber rifles.

The accuracy of the .458 is tops in its field; grouping better than 4 minutes of an angle at 100 yards.

For the person who is planning that trip to Africa for elephants or perhaps to the mountains for that grizzly, he couldn't select a better rifle for insuring a full game bag.

If you are wondering if that muzzle energy is actually going to be enough to stop whatever you're after, you might try stepping in front of a fast moving freight train. You'll get the same effect. If you still are not satisfied, you might try what Al Weber of California did. He took a Russian anti-tank rifle action and fitted it with a .50 caliber machine gun barrel. He said it was ideal for knocking off ground hogs at 2,000 yards and strong winds didn't faze the bullet at all up to 500 yards.

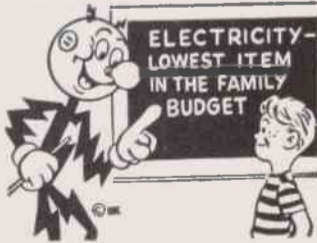
