Geology Class Visits Caves

6:00 A. M. Saturday the third of May found members of Dr. Heck's Geology 41 class gathered at the Ringside Grill ready to depart on another of Dr. Heck's famous excursions.

The trip underway, we had as our first stop the McKinney Feldspar Mines near Gooch Gap, N. C. We observed the open pit mines and watched mining operations as they were being performed. The feldspar is used in the making of pottery, china, and cheap rubber goods.
