A RESOLUTION COMMENDING CHARLOTTE COLLEGE AND WELCOMING IT INTO THE CONSOLIDATED UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA

WHEREAS: The Board of Trustees of the Consolidated University of North Carolina voted on November 16, 1964,

to make Charlotte College a part of the University system effective July 1, 1965, and

WHEREAS: Charlotte College has shown itself to be a rapidly expanding center of education which can be of significant value to the Consolidated University of North Carolina, now, therefore, **Be IT RESOLVED BY THE STUDENT LEGISLATURE OF THE UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA AT CHAPEL HILL THAT:**

Article I. The administration and faculty of Charlotte College is commended for its outstanding contribution to the people of the state of North Carolina.

Article II. The administration, faculty, and the Student Body of Charlotte College is welcomed into the Consolidated University of North Carolina.

Article III. Copies of this resolution be sent to the President, the Dean of the Faculty, and the President of the Student Body of Charlotte College; to both the Board of Trustees of the Consolidated University of North Carolina and the President of the Consolidated University of North Carolina and to the **Daily Tar Heel**.

Jimmy James Named To All-Tourney Team

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — Charlotte College won the first game of the Suncoast Classic with Maryville 68-55, but lost in the final round to Florida Presbyterian 82-66 Friday and Saturday, Jan. 8 and 9, to lose the tournament, for which the 49ers were defending champs.

The Floridians also tripped Charlotte's chances of remaining sole owner of the tournament trophy which the 49ers won last year.

The game with Maryville went like this:

The slow starting 49ers came from 32-22 at halftime to beat the Scots of Maryville College.

Led by Ronnie Robinson and Wally McGinty on offense and Charlie Jacobs on defense the fired up 49ers came out of the dressing room after halftime and in two minutes proceeded to close the gap to one point while allowing the hard pressed Scots only one shot at the basket.

The 49ers fell behind the first half when they seemed to lack the fiery edge to break through the Scots defense and were unable to prevent the Maryville guards from hitting their favorite long shots.

Tommy Gilliam was high scorer for the 49ers with 22 points followed by Wally McGinty with 17. Robinson also led in rebounding with 17 for the victors.

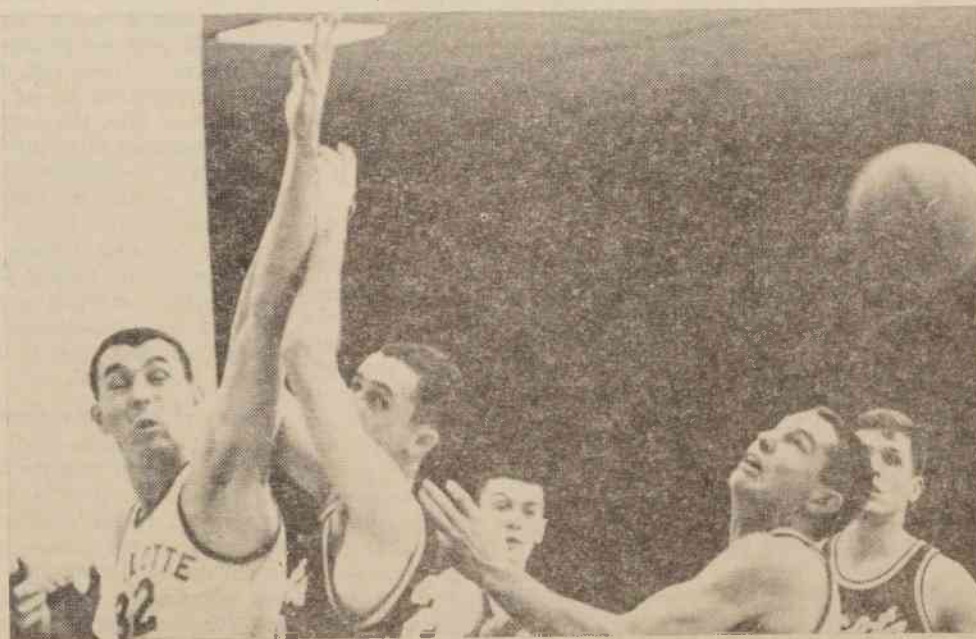
